Dear Parishioners,

Last Tuesday was the birthday of Vincent Lombardi, the Hall of Fame football coach of the Green Bay Packers (1959-1967), and considered by most sports fans to be the greatest football coach of all time. Coach Lombardi was born 100 years ago on June 11, 1913, and died from colon cancer on September 3, 1970. The Packers won five NFL championships under his leadership, including the first two Super Bowls.

ESPN ran a couple of specials in honor of the 100th anniversary of his birth in which they interviewed former players and others to gain some perspective into what made Coach Lombardi so special. One of the players interviewed was Jerry Kramer, drafted in 1958 along with Jim Taylor and Ray Nitschke, who played 11 seasons for the Packers at right guard.

Jerry recalled something Vince Lombardi said to the players at their first meeting after he took over as their new head coach. "Men," Coach Lombardi said, "we are going to relentlessly chase perfection. We know we can never attain it, but in the process we will catch excellence."

That motivational speech might just as well sum up our mission as Catholics. We are trying to respond as best as we can to the call of Jesus to "be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:48) Our effort must be sincere and unwavering despite our awareness of our weakness and sinfulness, because in striving to be perfect we just might attain excellence, or in religious parlance, holiness.

One of the reasons for Coach Lombardi's great success as a coach was the time, energy, and devotion he put into his work. In some ways he was a better coach than he was a husband and father, and as a devout Catholic, I am sure this must have bothered his conscience. He attended daily Mass and frequent confession as a means to try to reconcile the competing loves in his life.

We cannot achieve holiness without prayer, moral support, and frequent reception of the sacraments. Football players train and practice until their execu-

tion during games becomes fluid and automatic. They analyze game film to perfect their technique and correct mistakes. We do the same: we practice our faith and learn from our mistakes so as to achieve a sense of harmony with our neighbor and unity with God.

We are blessed to have a superior "playbook" in the Bible and Catechism, and the greatest teacher of all time in Jesus, our Good Shepherd. Therefore, there is absolutely no reason why we cannot be successful in leading good and holy lives of faith. Plus we have a supportive community in which to pray and develop our gifts for service. Our best years are still ahead of us as long as we trust in Christ and allow his spirit to guide and nourish us.

11th Sunday in Ordinary Time

A lot was made in the last election about the two parties' differing appeals to women voters. Since the ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment to the US Constitution, women have had the right to vote in every election. No candidate can afford to ignore more than half the population. Often the press will cite certain issues as being of particular concern to women (things like health care, violence, workplace equality, food security) as opposed to topics that the media would label as of more concern to men (defense, terrorism, banking and finance law). While legislators may find themselves attuned at one time to one part of the population, and then the other, in the end, they must respond to all of their constituents and be concerned with the common good.

The Gospel this weekend gives us an insight into the band of believers who followed Jesus in his ministry. Luke paints a portrait of a mixed group of followers. There were the Twelve, that is the apostles, but there were also a number of women, some of whom were influential people. We know from the letters of St. Paul that in the early church men and women worked together to build up the kingdom of God by spreading the message of Christ.

In forgiving the sinful woman in the Gospel, Jesus outlines a path to be taken in achieving the common good, a path of forgiveness and healing. These are not easy virtues to exercise in the political world, which is often a cutthroat, winner-take-all type of endeavor. As Christians, it is our duty to influence our legislators on the issues that will promote the common good of all rather than the personal good of some. As Luke's writings in his Gospel and in Acts of the Apostles points out, Christianity is a religion of community. In both our private and our public lives we profess our faith in Christ and we care for our neighbor.
