27th Sunday in Ordinary Time

About one-third of marriages end in divorce in the United States. The reasons for such an outcome are as varied as the individuals involved. Few of those who do divorce experience the high-profile questioning and scrutiny that public figures like celebrities or politicians do when they go through a divorce. Recent events in the past few months show that the private lives of public figures are never really private.

The Gospel this weekend tackles the closest of human relationships: the marriage of a man and a woman. In Mark's story, Jesus quotes the Book of Genesis, pushing together verses from the first and second chapters. In the first chapter of Genesis, humankind is created male and female in the divine image. In the second story of creation in chapter 2, the creation of woman is described as coming out of man, which is why the man now clings to his wife and the two become one.

In reflecting this biblical understanding of marriage, the church expects that a sacramental marriage between a man and a woman is permanent, a sign of the union between Christ and his people. At the same time, for a variety of reasons, the church recognizes that not every marriage may be a full and complete sacramental union. Sometimes the love that was professed on the wedding day was not a full and freely given consent to be joined together as one. That is why after a divorce, one or the other party may seek an annulment through the church, recognizing that the first union was not the full and complete sign of unity that is an example of Christ's complete love for us. If you, or someone you know, are divorced, please be a part of Sunday worship with the community of faith. If you've not yet spoken with a priest about your situation call the parish office to make a confidential appointment. As the Gospel suggests, Christ wants to embrace all his children.

"For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh. So they are no longer two but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, no human being must separate."

- Mk 10:7-9

Dear Parishioners,

This coming week of October 8-12 is the week during which all of the priests of the Diocese of Baton Rouge make their annual priests' retreat. Most of the priests will be at Manresa Retreat House but I am taking the opportunity to join a few other priests in a private retreat at St. Augustine Retreat House in Bay St. Louis, Mississippi. So please pray for us as we promise to do the same for all of you throughout the Diocese.

A life of faith does not make much sense without a commitment to prayer and this is especially true for priests. The danger for priests is that we become too focused on administration and the fulfillment of duties, and lose sight of our relationship with the Lord. One can only "fake it" for so long before one's vocation becomes meaningless and one begins to look for meaning and happiness elsewhere.

Pope Benedict XVI made a similar point in his recent address to the Bishops of Western France. He said, "Solving the pastoral problems that present themselves in your dioceses must never limit itself to organizational questions, however important these may be. This approach risks placing an emphasis on seeking efficiency through a sort of 'bureaucratization of pastoral care' focused on structures, organizations and programs, ones which can become 'self-reverential,' at the exclusive use of the members of those structures. These would have scarce impact on the life of Christians who are distanced from regular practice of the faith. Instead, evangelization requires starting from the encounter with the Lord, within a dialogue rooted in prayer, which then concentrates on the witness of giving itself toward the end of helping the people of our time to recognize and discover anew the signs of the presence of God."

Every homily is intended to illustrate God's activity in the world so that we are nourished by God's presence. A priest who steals time from prayer in order to carry out other important activities is in danger of losing contact with God's loving presence, and so having nothing much to say in his homilies. Hopefully we priests have enough sense to recognize the symptoms

when they occur and so rededicate ourselves to quality time with the Lord in prayer.

Most parishes either cancel their daily Masses or replace them with Communion Services during the week of the priests' retreat. We are somewhat unique in that we have Father Charles, chaplain at the Baton Rouge General, in temporary residence in our rectory. He has kindly agreed to celebrate Mass in my absence whenever he is able, and plans to celebrate all of the daily 8:00 a.m. Masses this coming week. Funerals will be handled on a case by case basis, but the Bishop has asked that we not interrupt our retreat if at all possible.

The first *Adult Evening of Faith* is this Thursday, October 11, from 6:00 p.m.—8:00 p.m. in the Activity Center. Our guest speakers are Jason Romero and Katie Austin, and I hope that many of you will be able to attend and benefit from their presentation. See you next weekend.
