Dear Parishioners,

Father Thomas Karachira will visit our parish next weekend, August 22-23, to make an appeal on behalf of the Missionaries of Compassion, a relatively new religious institute founded in 2003 in India. As their name implies, the *Missionaries* bring comfort and solace to the poor and suffering, especially the homeless, orphans, abandoned elderly, and people with terminal diseases. They work primarily in India, Africa, and Australia.

Father Karachira's visit is coordinated by our Diocesan Propagation of the Faith Office and provides an opportunity for us to support the pastoral ministry and missionary activity of the Church. We will have a second collection at each of our Masses next weekend to benefit the *Missionaries of Compassion* and their important ministry. As always, please make your checks out to St. John the Baptist Church so we can count and deposit the collection, and then forward the proceeds to our Propagation of the Faith Office, who will then forward the money to the *Missionaries of Compassion*.

The Mission Appeal will also allow me to sneak away for a week of vacation from Monday, August 17, through Tuesday afternoon, August 25. Father David Allen has a good friend who owns a house near Lake Tahoe, and so I am taking off with Father David, Father Paul Counce, and Bishop Shelton Fabre to spend some time enjoying the beautiful scenery around the lake and high Sierra. According to the weather forecast, the temperature ranges from a high of 80° during the day to about 45° at night, and should be perfect for sightseeing and relaxing.

The RCIA process for people interested in joining the Catholic Church has its Open House planned for Wednesday, August 26, at 6:30 p.m. in the rectory, so please invite any interested parties to attend. We will provide an overview of the process and try to answer any questions before enjoying some light refreshments. Please pray for our inquirers and the RCIA team who will guide them on this journey of faith.

The *Traveling Chalice* program of family prayer for vocations to the priesthood and consecrated religious life begins on the first Sunday in September. A schedule is located in the back of church for families to

sign-up. You merely select any available week and indicate which Mass you normally attend. I will then invite you forward after communion on that particular Sunday and present you with a box containing a chalice, books on family prayer, and various other resources related to religious vocations. You can then look over the material and select prayers to pray each evening for an increase in vocations.

The Baton Rouge Diocese accepted six new seminarians for seminary studies this fall: Deacon Pat Broussard, originally from New Iberia but a member of Holy Family Parish since his deacon ordination in 2010; Taylor Sanford from St. George Parish; Christian Landry from St. Jules Parish in Belle Rose; Alex Ruch from Most Blessed Sacrament Parish; Andrew Hotstream from St. John Parish in Prairieville; and James Vu from St. Thomas More Parish. Pray that God will one day call a young man from our parish to join them.

20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"The Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Today's Gospel continues Jesus' Bread of Life discourse where he emphasizes over and over again that his followers are to "eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood." Not surprisingly, his listeners don't know what to make of this mysterious teaching. So the quarrels begin. We can imagine what was being said: "He's just using analogies," one man would suggest. "No! He says it's 'true food' and 'true drink," another would reply. Others would accuse Jesus of blaspheming, while still others would assert that they believe every word he says. And so it went.

This scene is all too common. People encounter a difficult teaching of the faith--one that is challenging to fulfill or difficult to believe--and so they argue about it or rationalize it away instead of just accepting it and living according to it. On a large scale, these sorts of arguments are what lead to the breakdown of Christian unity. Time and time again in history, when a group of people disagrees about a Christian teaching, they splinter off and define their own set of beliefs. Not only does this harm the harmony of the Christian community, but it makes it too easy to avoid the tough parts of the faith.

Some of the things Jesus wants us to do are difficult-like respecting God's plan for sexuality or controlling our urges for unrestrained pleasure, power, or profit. Some of the things Jesus taught us are mysterious--like the teaching that the Eucharist is truly his body and blood. But thankfully he has given us his Holy Spirit to help us understand and do what we should. Let's not waste our time arguing about the faith. Let's just live it.
