Dear Parishioners.

Years ago, I attended a workshop led by Father Michael Heher, a priest of the Diocese of Orange, California, and author of a book of essays on the priesthood entitled, "The Lost Art of Walking on Water." The title of the book comes from our gospel reading for this 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time where Jesus suddenly approaches his disciples who are in a boat being tossed about in the waves and Peter is allowed to join Jesus walking on the water.

Father Heher is a great admirer of St. Peter with his reckless faith and his frequent missteps. He notes that as the number of priests shrinks there is a temptation to reduce the priesthood to only those things that priests can do, such as say Mass, hear confessions, and anoint the sick. As important as those things are, Heher writes that priests "have been entrusted with the care for souls, not simply with the task of supplying the baptized with the sacraments."

It's a subtle distinction but an important one. It's all too easy for priests to turn administration, counseling, catechesis, and works of mercy over to qualified and faith-filled laity. This would presumably allow parish priests to focus on spiritual matters like prayer and the sacraments. However this might unintentionally create an environment where priests develop only superficial relationships with their parishioners and become mere functionaries.

The Church needs priests who are generous and creative in addition to being dutiful and moral. Priests after the heart of St. Peter who risked sinking in order to walk on the water like Jesus, if only for a moment. St. Paul once described himself as being "poured out like a libation." Someone else pointed out that Paul said he was "poured out not burnt out." I pray that God will watch over all priests and help us to imitate the faith of Sts. Peter and Paul.



19th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Peter got out of the boat and began to walk on the water toward Jesus. But when he saw how strong the wind was, he became frightened." How can we describe Peter? At once faithful and fearful, his jumbled responses remind us that he was no spiritual superman, well intentioned though he may have been. Peter wanted to believe, and in fact showed a great deal of confidence in Christ, but the temptation to doubt was strong enough to knock him off his feet, literally.

"O you of little faith, why did you doubt?" Jesus reprimanded Peter. The words seem harsh. After all, Peter was the only one who had enough faith to even try something as ludicrous as stepping out of the boat onto the water in the first place. But perhaps Jesus wanted to emphasize that our faith needs to be strong enough to weather the storm, so to speak. If we only believe in Jesus when the wind is calm and the waves are gone, is that truly having faith in him? Is that actually trusting in his supreme power over the forces of the universe? Peter began to sink as soon as a challenge appeared. Jesus called him, and he calls us, to stay on our feet even when the winds begin to blow.

So, what are the winds that threaten our faith? What kinds of gusts are blowing today? Whatever it might be-health problems, financial concerns, relational struggles-none of it is too much for Jesus to handle. But we must step out in faith and trust him! And we need to keep our eyes on him as we do so, instead of getting distracted by the force of the challenges we face. Jesus is bigger than any problem. We have nothing to fear as long as we are walking towards him.
