Dear Parishioners,

This Thursday, August 28, is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the March on Washington and the famous keynote address entitled "I Have a Dream" delivered by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The historic gathering drew some 250,000 people and played a major role in the passage of the Civil Rights Act and the advancement of freedom and equality for all Americans.

Our country has come a long way since 1963 in terms of access to education, employment, and political office for all our citizens, and yet as a society we still struggle with prejudice and ignorance. Crime, poverty, and other social ills can allow old stereotypes to persist and prevent our growing together as one human family. Religious institutions are not immune to sinful and misbegotten attitudes and so ongoing conversion is a necessity for Catholics and all people of faith.

We know from experience that true conversion involves both the mind and the heart. If we are to grow in love and faith then we have to overcome erroneous beliefs and hardened hearts. We have to take advantage of opportunities to associate with people who are different from us so that we can discover our common humanity and expand our understanding and tolerance. We also need to avoid reading and watching materials and videos which promote hatred and discrimination.

Since Catholics are the majority in this part of the state it would be nice if we took the lead in furthering racial harmony. Doing so would help to create a much more loving environment for our children and grand-children to inherit. How I wish the Muslim majority in Arab countries would take the lead in recognizing and protecting the rights of their Christian neighbors and countrymen. They seem to allow a few demagogues to hijack their religion for political power and gain.

On a lighter note, football season has finally arrived and LSU is set to open its season against TCU in the Cowboys Classic contest next Saturday, August 31, 2013, in Arlington, Texas. I plan to be one of the Tiger faithful in attendance, along with two of my priest friends, Father David Allen and Father Paul Counce. We are likely to run into many other priests

and parishioners there including Father Matt Dupre. Thanks in advance to Father Joel LaBauve who has kindly agreed to cover all of my Masses next weekend, August 31-September 1, so I can make the trip.

### **21st Sunday in Ordinary Time**

State fairs are famous for their many contests. The best cow, the best pig, the best sheep are hailed as "Grand Champions." The best cake, the best raspberry jam, the finest pickles, and the most delectable pie are awarded blue ribbons. Cheese and butter, honey and maple syrup, fruits and vegetables, agricultural products of all kinds win prizes of distinction based on criteria for their category. Hand-crafted items are also entered into competition, and ribbons won displayed on the home mantle. While almost anyone can enter one of these contests, there is only one blue ribbon, only one grand champion.

In Sunday's Gospel we hear Jesus respond to a question posed to him about the number who will be saved. One of the tenets of our faith concerns the universal salvific will of God, that is, God wants everyone to be saved. But God has also given humankind free will, meaning that people have a choice in accepting God's invitation to salvation. For those of us who are believers, it can be difficult to comprehend that someone would not want to enjoy eternal life. But that is a choice that God offers, and the Gospel this Sunday reinforces the idea that being saved is more than just a casual acquaintance with Jesus.

Like a competition at the state fair, there are criteria for entering the kingdom of God. They are not mysterious. There is not some secret code that we need to know. What is needed is clearly spelled out just like the rules for entering a pie or jar of canned peaches. We need to love God. We need to listen to his word. We need to be compassionate toward others. We need to love our neighbor. The difference between these criteria and entering a state fair contest is that there is always more than one grand champion in the Christian life. Everyone who follows faithfully gets a blue ribbon.
