Dear Parishioners,

I am away this weekend attending the Confirmation Retreat for our 11<sup>th</sup> graders at Rosaryville Retreat House. Please pray for us that this will be the start of a grace-filled year for our Confirmation candidates and all of our other parishioners preparing for the sacraments. I thank Father Tony Russo and Father Jerry Burns for celebrating our Masses this weekend so I can spend time on retreat with our 11<sup>th</sup> graders.

Remember that we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick next Saturday, August 10, immediately following the 4:30 p.m. Vigil Mass. Any person who is seriously ill because of sickness, old age, or injury may be anointed. The illness may be either physical or mental. Anointing is also allowed prior to undergoing surgery. Please spread the word to your family and friends who may be in need of the healing graces provided through this special sacrament. And please pray for your fellow parishioners who are hospitalized, homebound, or struggling with cancer or some other serious illness.

I hope you agree that our wood floors in church look better than ever after some needed maintenance to reapply the stain and protective sealant. The floors were not horrible, but we were advised to address the wear and tear now before it became more widespread. Plus our church is a great source of pride for all of us and we want to give it the care that it deserves. Holydays sometimes involve sacrifice on our part but we know that such sacrifices also bring benefits to our lives.



In fiscal 2012, lottery sales in the United States averaged approximately \$250 per person. Forty-three states and the District of Columbia accounted

for that \$78 billion in sales. It was in March 2012 that the largest prize to date (\$656 million) was split between three winners. While it is clear that many people enjoy playing the lottery recreationally, a question that is often asked is, "What does someone do with all that money?" Of course, that particular problem has not seemed to bother those who play regularly. Indeed, the largest jackpots, far from being a deterrent, end up provoking an even greater number of players, who seem intent on turning a single dollar into a large fortune.

The Gospel this weekend offers a perspective on the material world. While possessions are needed, Jesus says, "One's life does not consist of possessions" (Lk 12:15). This comment by Jesus is not something new to any of us. We have heard this all before. But we also know that there is wisdom in storing up for ourselves. As a matter of fact, saving for the future is an act of personal responsibility. We are constantly told to save for retirement, to have a rainy-day fund, to set aside something for a vacation instead of going into debt to take one. All of these actions are so we don't become overly dependent on the social fabric and cause an undue burden on others.

There is a difference between having a sufficiency and having an excess. When our desire for an excess outstrips our reasonableness and our need, then we are flirting with greed, the very thing that the Gospel warns against. Yes, we may work hard, and save for the future. We may even win the lottery. But when we have more than we need the Lord expects that we use it not just for ourselves but also for others. What we do with the blessings we have makes all the difference.
