Dear Parishioners,

We will celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick next Saturday, August 15, immediately following the 4:30 p.m. Vigil Mass. Any person who is seriously ill because of sickness, old age, or injury may be anointed. The illness may be either physical or mental, and can include addictions. Anointing is also allowed prior to undergoing surgery. Please spread the word to your family and friends who may be in need of the healing graces provided through this special sacrament. And please pray for your fellow parishioners who are hospitalized, homebound, or struggling with cancer or some other serious illness

Saturday, August 15, is also the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary and normally a holy day of obligation. However Catholics are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass this year since the holy day falls on a Saturday. We will nonetheless celebrate a Mass in honor of our Blessed Mother at 9:00 a.m. on August 15 for those who wish to attend. The 4:30 p.m. Mass later that same day will be the anticipated Mass for the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time.

Please remember that our R.C.I.A. process for people interested in joining the Catholic Church starts back up at the end of this month. We have an Open House planned for Wednesday, August 26, at 6:30 p.m. in the rectory, so please invite your relatives, friends, or neighbors who may have expressed an interest in learning more about the Catholic faith or who wish to join the Church. Refreshments will be served along with information on the classes.

Be assured of my prayers and best wishes to all of our students and teachers at the start of this new school year. Registration for religion classes is also set to begin soon and will be offered weekdays during regular office hours and after all of our Masses on the weekend of August 29-30. We have also invited one of our catechists to speak at all of our Masses next weekend August 15 & 16, in an effort to encourage more adults to consider helping with this important ministry.

I mentioned a few weeks ago that I would like to restart the Traveling Chalice program to encourage family prayer for vocations to the priesthood and consecrated religious life. I have been gathering books on family prayer and various other resources related to religious vocations to aid in this effort. All of these materials will be placed in a box, along with a chalice, and then presented to one of our families each Sunday at the Mass of their choosing.

Each evening, Monday through Friday, the family would display the chalice and pray a rosary or a few short prayers together on behalf of vocations. The Bible instructs us to "ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest" (Matt. 9:38), and that is precisely what we intend to do. Ryan Robicheaux and Curtis Dupuy have kindly agreed to oversee the schedule and remind families of their dates. I would like to begin on the first Sunday in September so please see the schedule in the back of church if your family would like to participate and volunteer for a week



19th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"I am the living bread come down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever." Three astonishing claims in one sentence. First: Jesus announces that he came from heaven. Second: He says that he is bread for people to eat. Third: He promises eternal life to anyone who eats this bread. What a lineup! What tremendous faith he expected of these people to believe such radical statements.

First, he wants them to believe that he was sent by God the Father. He wants them to believe that he is one with God. If we ever struggle to believe this, just imagine how much harder it must have been for these folks who knew him as a normal guy: "Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph? Do we not know his father and mother? Then how can he say, 'I have come down from heaven'?" We have the benefit of Scripture, the tradition of the church, thousands of years of Christian witness, and the sacraments to convince us of who Jesus is. They didn't.

Next, he does all this talking about bread. He refers to the miraculous manna--bread that fed the wandering Jews in the desert--and then claims that he is the new manna. He is the true bread; his flesh, in fact, is this bread. His body will become food. Again, we have the whole history of Eucharistic faith, devotion, and miracles to rely on. They didn't.

Finally, he goes so far as to say that in receiving him as bread, we will live forever. He promises that this intimate union with him through Communion brings with it the gift of eternal life. Yes, these three claims work together: Jesus is God. The bread of Communion is God. And this God we receive is the source of eternal life.
