1st Sunday of Advent

Tough economic times weigh on everyone. While some people seem to be able to afford everything, go everywhere, and enjoy what they want, there are so many people that have come to a point in their lives where every penny is pinched and every purchase scrutinized. Data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics shows that consumers are spending less on big-ticket items to afford basics. Households hit by layoffs, the tight job market, and heavy debt burdens are holding back on spending. The savings rate has dropped, indicating that consumers are using up scant resources to stay afloat. Even people who might be able to spend a little more are being cautious, because the economic mood is so gloomy. The words of Jesus in today's Gospel could well characterize the overall global experience, "on earth nations will be in dismay."

It might seem a bit odd that we begin Advent, which is a season of hope, with a rather dismal and disturbing Gospel. The end of time is not something that we usually think about to any great extent. We are often more concerned with the anxieties of daily life, as the Gospel puts it. Those daily worries seem like enough for most of us. We don't need to add the end of the world on top of it.

But for many people today, in this economic environment, daily anxieties can seem like the end of the world. Bills mount up, tensions grow, jobs or homes are lost. We need this season of hope to renew our own longings and expectations. The prophet Isaiah reminds us that God fulfills his promises. God's mercy endures in every generation, including ours. The actions we take to assist others become an expression of God's mercy and a sign of God's renewing hope. In the weeks to come even a small kindness to someone could help to ease anxiety, and help that person believe that redemption is at hand.

"Then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. But when these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand." - Lk 21:27-28

Dear Parishioners,

We finally have all of the numbers tabulated for this year's *Feast on the Levee* and our net income is a little over \$54,000. This amount is about \$16,000 less than last year but I still consider the Feast a great success in terms of the community spirit that I witnessed on the day of the fair. Thanks once again to Scott and Pamela Rhodes and all of you who worked so hard to benefit our Church and community.

The income from the *Feast* has now been deposited into our Building Fund savings account. The previous balance of this account was only about \$950 since all of its monies were used to pay for the renovations to our church. I decided to deposit this year's fair proceeds into this account to help build up our savings for future needs.

The debt on the church renovation now stands at \$1.43 million and we are on pace to pay it off in 12 years. All of your contributions to the monthly building fund collection go directly for this purpose. Some parishioners have suggested that we also apply the entire *Feast* income to the loan. While I would love to pay off the loan early, I believe the "slow and steady" approach is a more prudent way to retire the debt.

This approach allows us the option of addressing smaller projects on our master plan even while we work to retire the debt. Examples are improvements to the parish activity center, parish office building, a new storage building, and additional parking for the church. None of these examples are urgent and we may wish to wait a long time before tackling them but I like having the flexibility to address needs in a timely manner.

I know I have not yet been here long enough for us to build a relationship of trust, but I do assure you that any ideas and plans for capital improvements will be brought before the Parish Pastoral Council and the finance committee for discussion and input. The yet to be formed Cemetery Committee will provide a similar consultative body for matters concerning the cemetery.

Please note that we have a new member on our Parish Pastoral Council, Mrs. Katie Roettger. There was a vacancy on the council for a pastor's appointee and we all felt that a young adult parishioner would provide a valuable and needed perspective. Katie was recently hired as the project coordinator for the Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry at the Diocese, the same position previously held by Peggy LeBlanc and Julie Cilano.

The annual appeal for the Retirement Fund for Religious is next weekend, December 8/9. This is our chance to help provide for our consecrated religious who have given so much to the church over the years. Since this is also the weekend for our monthly building fund collection I ask that you place your envelopes for the Religious Retirement in the first collection. Finally, Saturday, December 8, is the Feast of the Immaculate Conception and a holy day of obligation. Our Mass for the feast will be at 8:00 a.m. St. John Church in Plaquemine and Holy Family Church in Port Allen will each celebrate a Friday evening vigil Mass if that time is more convenient for you.
