Dear Parishioners,

The grace-filled season of Lent begins this Wednesday, February 14, so give some thought on how you wish to deepen your faith during this special time. Our Masses on **Ash Wednesday** will be at 8:00 a.m., 12:00 noon, and 6:00 p.m. Daily Mass during Lent remains at the normal time of 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday, but moves to 6:00 p.m. on the Wednesdays of Lent. Benediction and Adoration remains at 8:30 a.m. on Friday mornings or immediately following the Friday morning Mass.

On the **Wednesdays of Lent**, confessions are at 5:30 p.m., followed by Mass at 6:00 p.m. and then the Way of the Cross at 6:30 p.m. I will also be in the confessional from 6:30 p.m. – 7:30 p.m. each Wednesday as part of the "Light is On for You" program. I encourage everyone to try to attend at least one daily Mass each week as part of your Lenten devotions.

We are excited to offer a three-night Lenten Mission this year led by Mrs. Becky Eldredge. The Mission will be held Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday, March 4, 5, and 6, beginning at 7:00 p.m. each night. Becky is an Ignatian-trained spiritual director, retreat facilitator, and writer. She is married with three children and lives in her hometown of Baton Rouge. We look forward to another blessed opportunity to strengthen our faith and deepen our love for God.

Last week I asked you to remember to pray for more vocations to the priesthood, but let us not forget to pray for more vocations to the consecrated religious life as well. I say this because our community is blessed to have a parishioner who entered a Carmelite community one week ago on February 2<sup>nd</sup>. Miss Joy Jason has been discerning a vocation for some time and her prayer and study ultimately led her to the Monastery of the Most Blessed Virgin Mary of Mount Carmel located in Morristown, New Jersey.

This particular monastery was founded in 1926, and the Carmelite sisters who live here are cloistered, which means they live, work, and pray within the enclosed walls of their monastery. They intentionally limit their contact with the outside world in order to better devote themselves to praying for everyone in

the Church and the world. The community numbers about 15-18 sisters which is close to its capacity.

Our parish office will be closed on Monday and Tuesday of this week for Mardi Gras, and our morning Mass is also canceled on Tuesday, Mardi Gras Day. Have a safe and happy holiday and see you on Wednesday. Remember that Ash Wednesday, like Good Friday, is a day of both fast and abstinence, meaning that we limit ourselves to one full meal (and two light snacks), and abstain from eating meat. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

Now that football season is finally ended we can switch our attention to the Winter Olympics, and the home opener of LSU baseball. I predict another very successful season for Coach Paul Mainieri's team. The Winter Olympics are not as interesting as the summer games, but I nevertheless enjoy watching the skill of the athletes and the healthy competition between nations.

## LENTEN REGULATIONS FOR THE DIOCESE OF BATON ROUGE

Catholics aged 18 thru 59 are bound by a grave obligation to observe a solemn fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Catholics between the ages of 14 and up are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday, as well.

To fast means to consume only one full meal a day, although taking of other smaller quantities of food at the other, mealtimes is permitted. Food and drink "between meals" (excepting only water & medicine) is not permitted on fast days.

To abstain from meat means refraining from eating beef, veal, pork, or poultry. The consumption of fish, shellfish, and reptiles is permitted if desired.

#### **Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

We may not like it, but generosity and risk often go hand-in-hand. At least, that's what Jesus shows us in today's Gospel as a leper approaches him for healing. Until the nine-teenth century, lepers were shunned to the margins of society for fear of spreading the disease. To touch a leper was to risk becoming unclean yourself. In today's Gospel, Jesus defies convention. "Moved with pity, he reached out his hand, [and] touched him." The leper is healed! But this is not the only risk Jesus takes.

Before Jesus heals the man, he knows full well the desperate nature of his situation. Jesus knows that this man will be overjoyed upon being healed and that he just might tell everyone he knows. For a Messiah looking to temporarily fly under the radar, healing this particular leper might not be the best idea. Jesus heals anyway.

It can be easy to become calculated in our giving. If I go out of my way to help this person, how will it affect my reputation? How will this charitable donation affect my budget? How could I possibly make time to volunteer regularly? In today's Gospel, Jesus casts these concerns aside. He touches the untouchable. He reaches the unreachable. For his efforts, he receives a betrayal of his request for silence. "The man went away and began to publicize the whole matter." Before long "it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly." Jesus is forced to remain "outside in the deserted places." It would appear, perhaps, that he is unable to accomplish his mission.

When we take a risk to be generous, things might not follow the prescribed path. We might be disappointed. We also might be surprised! Our witness to radical generosity is attractive to a world in desperate need. Indeed, when Jesus took risks for love, "People kept coming to him from everywhere."
