Dear Parishioners,

The grace-filled season of Lent begins this Wednesday, February 18, so please take some time to decide on one or two activities of prayer or penance to deepen your faith and draw you closer to God. Our Masses on Ash Wednesday will be at 8:00 a.m., 12:00 noon, and 6:00 p.m., and starting next week our Wednesday Mass will move to 6:00 p.m. followed by the Way of the Cross at 6:30 p.m. for the entire season of Lent (except for Holy Week). Even if your work or school schedule will not allow you to attend morning Mass on most days, you may be able to attend the Wednesday evening Mass each week as an extra opportunity to nourish your faith life.

In addition to the Eucharist, the Sacrament of Confession offers another opportunity to deepen our sense of God's mercy and love. Confession will be available in our church every Wednesday evening from 5:30 – 5:50 p.m. just prior to the 6:00 p.m. Mass, and then from 6:30 – 7:30 p.m. (during the Way of the Cross). Opportunities for confession will be limited during Holy Week so please try to go sometime during the first five weeks of Lent.

Priests are fortunate in that we have ample opportunities to celebrate Mass as part of our vocation and ministry. But we still benefit by taking on extra sacrifices for Lent and removing certain forms of temptation from our lives. I know plenty of priests who give up alcohol for Lent, and I am working up the courage to join them this year. I usually restrict my television and internet usage which allows more time for me to catch up on some reading. Our goal is to make these 40 days different from the rest of the year so that we can become more thoughtful and considerate.

We are excited to offer a four-night Parish Mission this Lent led by Father Blaise Czaja, CP, (pronounced "Chai-ah"). Father Czaja will introduce the theme of the Mission at all of our Masses the weekend of March 21 & 22, and then offer his main presentations at 7:00 p.m. on Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings, March 22, 23, 24, and 25. You are welcome to attend some of the talks even if you cannot attend all four nights.

The theme for this year's Lenten Mission is "On the Way to Jesus Christ." Sunday night's talk will center on Grace; Monday night's session will focus on Repentance and will include an opportunity for confession; Tuesday night's theme is Eucharist; and Wednesday night's talk is entitled God's Family. Father Czaja has also offered to celebrate an 8:00 a.m. morning Mass on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday mornings for the benefit of those who cannot attend the evening presentations. His morning talks will take the form of a twenty minute homily at each of the 8:00 a.m. Masses.

Our parish office will be closed on Monday and Tuesday of this week for Mardi Gras, and our morning Mass is also canceled on Tuesday, Mardi Gras Day. I will probably do a little work around the house before getting together with friends for food and drink later in the day. Have a safe and happy holiday and see you on Wednesday. Remember that Ash Wednesday is a day of both fast and abstinence.

St. John the Baptist Parish has been a place of prayer and friendship for almost two hundred years. While there is presently no comprehensive history of our parish, we do have "bits and pieces" of the past. For example, we have an account of Raphael Hebert, who in the 1830's, resigned from the Board of Wardens rather than go against his conscience. His daughter, Marguerite Hebert, is remembered by older parishioners as an inspiring, if not demanding, elementary teacher. And, how many parishioners knew members of the Addis Rosary Group, formed in 1945 by Rosemary Harvey and Carmen Caldwell and continued until 2000, weekly praying for world peace? Such stories of faith are abundantly present among us, and we will hear more when "We Remember" is performed. As we celebrate 180 years, may we all remember being inspired by the faith of our ancestors as we, the present generation, seek to continue to be a Christ-centered community.

6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"He remained outside in deserted places, and people kept coming to him from everywhere." Nothing could stop the crowds from gathering. Men, women, and children traveled from near and far-everywhere--to find Jesus. Even when he was not easily accessible, even when he was in deserted places that were probably remote, hard to find, and not welcoming to weary pilgrims, they found him. Word had spread quickly about the miraculous healing of the leprous man. And people wanted to know what it was all about. Undoubtedly, once they found Jesus, they knew that this was no ordinary man. Yes, he had the power to cure illnesses and drive out demons. But more than that, he had the power to change hearts. His words of compassion and mercy, and the actions that backed them up, must have caused many a conversion during those encounters in the deserted places.

Whether it was simple curiosity or profound faith that led all of those people to find Jesus we'll never know. It was most likely some of both. But regardless of the motivation, once they found him everyone could see Jesus for who he really was. Although we don't have the opportunity to see him in person, we do have the chance to search for Jesus and to find him. Sometimes, he may seem remote. Maybe we don't automatically feel his presence. Perhaps, when times are tough, we wonder where he is hiding. But when we persevere in our journey by praying, reading the Bible, and receiving the sacraments, we too can find the Lord. And as we bring our needs to him, Jesus will be "moved with pity" for us as well and will extend to us the healing love that has transformed so many hearts throughout Christian history.
