Dear Parishioners,

I will be in New Orleans on Wednesday and Thursday of this week attending Alumni Day at Notre Dame Seminary. I usually try to attend Alumni Day each year to enjoy some priestly fraternity, visit with our seminarians, and support the good work of the seminary. We will have a Communion Service here on Thursday morning in my absence.

Our diocese started the year with 23 seminarians: 12 studying at Notre Dame Seminary and 11 studying at St. Joseph Seminary College. However, due to the ongoing nature of prayer and discernment, 7 of those men have now resigned from seminary studies leaving us with 16 seminarians spread between the two schools.

It is always our hope that between 50 to 60% of those who enter the seminary will eventually be ordained priests. We have two men scheduled for ordaination this May – Deacon Pat Broussard and Deacon Ryan Hallford – and one scheduled for ordination next year – Mr. Tim Grimes. Meanwhile two priests have announced their retirement from active ministry this summer so we are barely staying even in terms of numbers.

Priests in our diocese are eligible to retire at the age of 68. Most work past that age and we currently have 8 priests over the age of 68 who are still serving as pastors. (The oldest is Msgr. Robert Berggreen, pastor of St. Mary Church in New Roads, who is 77 years old.) So we need to continue to pray for vocations and at the same time prepare for the inevitable changes to the staffing of our parishes and the times and places in which Sunday Masses are offered. A diocesan team is currently working with Father Chris Decker to devise a more manageable Mass schedule for the three churches serving Grosse Tete, Maringouin, and Livonia.

Lent is just over one week away so please take note of our Mass and confession schedule for Lent. Our Masses on **Ash Wednesday**, March 1, 2017, will be at 8:00 a.m., 12:00 noon, and 6:00 p.m. Daily Mass remains at the normal time of 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday, but moves to 6:00 p.m. on the Wednesdays of Lent. Benediction and Adoration remains at 8:30 am on Friday mornings or immediately following the Friday morning Mass.

On the **Wednesdays of Lent**, confessions are at 5:30 p.m., followed by Mass at 6:00 p.m. and then the Way of the Cross at 6:30 p.m. led by Deacon Sammy. I will return to the confessional from 6:30 p.m. – 7:30 p.m. each Wednesday as part of the "Light is On for You" program. I encourage everyone to try to attend at least one daily Mass each week as part of your Lenten devotions.

Make sure to mark your calendars for this year's Lenten Mission to be held on four consecutive evenings, March 26-29, beginning at 7:00 p.m. each night. Our Mission is being led this year by Father Matthew Bonk, CSsR, who will introduce the Mission by preaching at all of the weekend Masses on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. We look forward to another blessed opportunity to strengthen our faith and deepen our love for God.

## SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"Give to the one who asks of you, and do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow." Today Jesus continues the powerful teaching of his Sermon on the Mount. Typical of this famous sermon, here he urges us to see things in a new way, specifically regarding situations and people who bother us. First, he tells us not to seek revenge. Instead, we are to demonstrate incredible generosity. Then, he instructs us to "love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you."

These instructions don't come naturally to most of us. We are much more inclined to want to get even with those who cause us to suffer, and to wish ill for those who have hurt us. But Jesus proposes another way.

In truth, what good does it do to seek revenge or foster hate? It only continues the cycle of evil. Jesus encourages behavior that will stop the cycle short. He gives us a model that--although it may not change the heart of our "enemies"--will nonetheless change OUR hearts for the better. When pressed into service for one mile, if we voluntarily go two, then WE are the ones whose attitude and experience is certain to change. Instead of spending the length of that one mile cursing and complaining, we spend the length of two enjoying a surprising kind of freedom: "I chose to do this," instead of "I am being forced to do this."

When we practice the generosity of giving more than we are asked, and the charity of praying for those who persecute us, we will find ourselves in a position to transcend the trouble. It sets us free to not be mastered by the evil around us. Thus, we are able to help end the cycle of evil and begin a new cycle of love and peace.
