### **February 24, 2013**



### 2nd Sunday of Lent

Many of us have buried relatives or friends who have had an impact on our lives. Standing there in the funeral home or meditating at their grave, we can recall what they meant to us, how their words or actions touched us in some way, how what they did gave some shape to the person we are today. Often, it is only years later that we recognize in ourselves some of their own character.

Every year on the Second Sunday of Lent, we hear a version of the story of the transfiguration of Jesus. Matthew, Mark, and Luke each describe the experience in a rather similar fashion. But Luke adds something that the others leave out. As Jesus converses with Moses and Elijah who have appeared alongside him on the mountain, Luke says that they "spoke of his exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem." This is pure Lucan theology. Luke constructs his Gospel in such a way that Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem where he will accomplish the fulfillment of his Father's will through his death and resurrection. In doing so, he ushers in the era of the church on which the Holy Spirit is poured out, as a prelude to the triumph of the kingdom of God. For Luke, the exodus of Jesus in Jerusalem is his passover from death to life in the glory of the Resurrection. The Transfiguration is a glimpse of that glory.

In a way, at the top of that mountain, Peter, James, and John were already witnessing what could be the impact of this man in their lives. He was going to change everything. As he has done with us! During Lent we take some time to reflect on what the life and teaching of Jesus means to us. We don't stand at his grave, but at an empty tomb, and recall that the One who passed over from death to life holds that promise for us as well.

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While he was praying his face changed in appearance and his clothing became dazzling white. And behold, two men were conversing with him, Moses and Elijah, who appeared in glory and spoke of his exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem. - Lk 9:29-31

Dear Parishioners,

Please mark your calendars for our two-night Lenten Mission to be preached by Father Michael Alello on Sunday, March 3, and Monday, March 4, 2013. Father Alello, ordained in 2009, is one of the outstanding young priests of our diocese and currently serves as pastor of St. Philomena Parish in Labadieville.

A parish mission or retreat is a grace-filled time of prayer and encouragement, when we come together at church for further study and reflection on the gift and challenge of faith. There is often music to help center our hearts, and then an expanded version of a Sunday homily so that the retreat director is able to illustrate some of the dynamics of living the Gospel according to the insights of our Catholic faith.

Our Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI, has stressed the need for a new evangelization of people like us who are already Catholic but perhaps not living the lives we should be. Lent is an appropriate time to examine our lives and recommit ourselves to greater intimacy with the Lord in preparation for Easter. Father Alello will serve as the igniter to start the fire of God's love burning within our hearts again.

We were all shocked to hear of Pope Benedict XVI's decision to resign from the papacy effective 1:00 p.m. Central Time this coming Thursday, February 28, 2013. We were shocked but later edified as we reflected upon the wisdom and humility evident behind such a courageous decision. For a secular analogy, it kind of reminds me of George Washington's decision to resign as commander-in-chief at the end of the Revolutionary War, and his later decision to not seek a third term as president of the United States. Both decisions point to the greatness of his character and I think we are witnessing something similar in the Holy Father's resignation.

Our first pope, St. Peter, was the most human of all popes, someone completely unconcerned with public perception. He did not have a fully developed institution to cover some of his faults and imperfections, but like all popes he preached the Gospel and worked to safeguard and strengthen the community of believers.

In the end he asked to be crucified upside down in recognition of his unworthiness to share the exact form of our Savior's death

Modern day popes are equally human but are somewhat protected by all of the rituals, traditions, and structures that have developed over time and with our growth in numbers. Serving as the universal shepherd of the Church is a great honor but also a great burden since so much of the Pope's time is controlled by the outside forces of circumstance and necessity. Pope Benedict could have stayed on as a figure head but his heart told him that our Church needed a shepherd who could actively protect us from error and lead us to heaven. Please pray for our Holy Father during this time of transition, and for the Holy Spirit to guide the College of Cardinals when they meet to choose the next successor of Peter.


