Dear Parishioners,

Our Parish Finance Committee met recently to review our parish finances for the first six months of the fiscal year, July – December 2013. Our income from Sunday collections, sacramental offerings, religious education fees, and other earnings totaled \$320,705 or \$10,500 more than we anticipated when we set the budget. Our building fund collections and donations for the same period totaled an additional \$97,065 which allowed us to contribute \$20,337 more to debt reduction than our scheduled six month payment of \$76,728. Thank you very much for your generous and sacrificial support of our parish.

Unfortunately, our expenses for the same six month period also exceeded our budget by several thousand so we will have to do some belt tightening to get them under control these next six months. The expenditures included higher utilities, expanded sacramental preparation and ministry to youth, and repairs to our exterior lighting. None of these expenses are frivolous but they were higher than anticipated. As I mentioned in one of the previous bulletins, the \$59,000 in net income from this year's *Feast on the Levee* was divided three ways with \$19,000 deposited into our parish savings, \$20,000 deposited into our building fund savings, and \$20,000 applied to the principal on our loan. I am thankful for the safety net provided by the *Feast* income each year.

Many parishioners use the Automatic Bank Draft option for their stewardship offering to the Church so please know that this is available if you would like to set it up. It typically means switching to a monthly schedule of giving rather than weekly, but you can choose the first or fifteenth of each month for your contribution, and use it for the regular offertory as well as the building fund. However, it may be easier to continue to use the mailed envelopes for the special and second collections. Please talk to Carolyn Dupuy in the office for more information or for assistance in switching over to this method of giving.

I still write a check for my own contributions but I know it is only a matter of time before I switch to some type of automatic transfer. I already utilize online banking to pay my credit card bill, car note,

and retirement contributions, and I do find it easier than writing a check. Advancements in technology will probably make it even easier and with a higher level of security, so get ready for more options over the next few years. We may miss the symbolism of placing our offerings in the collection basket but the main thing is that we return a share of our financial blessings in recognition of God's generosity to us. People who never give to the Church or to other charities are missing out on the joy that comes from giving.

Now that football season is finally ended we can switch our attention to the Winter Olympics, along with a healthy mix of basketball and baseball. I especially enjoy attending some of the L.S.U. baseball games whenever I can arrange my schedule. The Winter Olympic games are not as interesting as the summer games, but I nevertheless enjoy watching the skill of the athletes and the competition between nations. Have a good week!

5th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"You are the salt of the earth...you are the light of the world." Being Christian is not supposed to be boring!
