On coming up out of the water he saw the heavens being torn open and the Spirit, like a dove, descending upon him. And a voice came from the heavens, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." - Mk 1:9-11

Dear Parishioners,

This past Thursday, January 8, marked the 200th anniversary of the Battle of New Orleans. As most of us learned in school, the decisive battle was fought after a peace treaty had been signed ending the War of 1812. However recent historical research sheds new light on the significance of the battle. Documents uncovered in the National Archives in London reveal that Major Gen. Sir Edward Pakenham had secret orders to disregard any news of peace and capture the city of New Orleans. A victory by the British could well have changed the course of history and refashioned Louisiana as a British colony.

The British force of 11,000 under Pakenham was opposed by an American force of 4,000 under the command of Major Gen. Andrew Jackson. The first battles took place in December of 1814 on Lake Borgne and then on land in and around Villeré plantation located just below the city. The British forces then paused which allowed Jackson time to fortify the American line along a canal stretching from the Mississippi River to the cypress swampland.

The citizens of New Orleans were very fearful of being captured by the British and also worried that Jackson might burn the city in order to prevent it from falling into British hands. Many wives and mothers of the American defenders gathered with the sisters in the Ursuline Convent chapel on the night of January 7 in prayer before the statue of Our Lady of Prompt Succor. On the morning of January 8, Father Dubourg arrived to celebrate Mass in the chapel. Before the Mass had ended, a messenger rushed in and announced an American victory over the British. A Mass of thanksgiving has been celebrated on the anniversary of the battle every year since 1815.

Confirmation candidates are reminded of their final "Day of Reflection" this weekend on Sunday, January 11, in preparation for celebrating their Confirmation at 7:00 p.m. this Thursday, January 15. Bishop Robert Muench always enjoys interacting with youth and I know he will make the celebration of the sacrament a memorable experience for our candidates and their families. Since Confirmation completes the sacraments of initiation, our 11th graders will now be qualified

to serve as godparents at baptisms and as sponsors at future confirmations.

I will be away from the parish this week from Sunday afternoon, January 11, through Thursday, January 15, attending the annual Spring Formation Days with all of the priests of the Baton Rouge Diocese. Our theme this year is "Learning to Embrace the Gifts of Priesthood: Getting to Healthy and Happy," and our presenters are Very Rev. James Greenfield, OSFS, a member of the Oblates of St. Francis de Sales; and Mr. Jeff Soileau and Ms. Claudia Cormier, RD, both with Healthy Lives and Our Lady of the Lake Medical Center.

Since the Study Days are mandatory for all priests, we will not be able to have daily Mass on Tuesday — Thursday this week. The priests who I sometimes call to celebrate Mass in my absence will also be attending the study days, so we will have Communion Services in place of the Masses on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of this week. Bishop Muench has also published a letter in the *Catholic Commentator* asking that funerals be scheduled after the study days are over if possible, or that one of our deacons celebrate the funeral without a Mass



The Baptism of the Lord

"I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals." That was a lowly job. Removing someone's sandals back in the days when everyone walked everywhere on dusty, sandy desert ground was a dirty task. So when John the Baptist said he wasn't even worthy for that humble duty, he was emphasizing an important point.

John understood Jesus' real identity. He knew that this was not just another good man, not just a wise teacher or a gifted leader. John realized that Jesus was truly Godmade-man. And because of this, the prophet also comprehended how perfect Jesus was. In relation to this perfection, John honestly acknowledged his own sinfulness with this analogy about the sandals. But look what happened: even though John proclaimed that "one mightier than I is coming after me," Jesus showed up at the Jordan River and asked John to baptize him! Jesus humbled himself by going through this ritual of cleansing and purification, even though he didn't need to. John may have thought himself unworthy, but that didn't stop Jesus from coming to him.

Jesus wants to come to us too. Not because we have "earned" his love or because we are "worthy" of some great honor, but simply because he loves us. God sent his Son to us to be one of us, to walk among us, to care for us and guide us. When we were baptized, he counted us among his beloved children in a special way, but that joyful bond is not a thing of the past. By our baptism we are always his children, even when we may be disobedient or belligerent ones. His love is not calculated or quantified; it is a free gift. May we appreciate this gift enough to show our gratitude by a life well lived.
