Dear Parishioners,

A brief news article appeared last month entitled "Last Priest from Dachau Concentration Camp Dies at 102." It caught my interest because I too am a priest, and I have visited Dachau on two separate occasions, and I have also read a couple of priest's memoirs, most notably "Priestblock 25487" by Father Jean Bernard.

Dachau is a mere 10 miles from Munich and opened in 1933 as the first Nazi concentration camp in Germany. It operated for some 12 years until its liberation by U.S. troops in April 1945. It originally held political prisoners but gradually expanded to include communists, socialists, homosexuals, Gypsies, Jehovah's Witnesses, Jews, Christian clergy, and others.

Records list 2,720 clergy imprisoned at Dachau over its 12 years, with 94% of them identified as Catholic priests. About 1,000 clergy died during their imprisonment. The great majority of the Catholic priests were from Poland, but the German priests numbered over 400. Father Jean Bernard, the author of "Priestblock," was from Luxembourg. The subject of the recent news article was Father Hermann Scheipers of the Diocese of Dresden-Meissen in Germany.

Father Scheipers' obituary published by a German Catholic news agency states that he drew the attention of the Nazis by celebrating Mass and hearing confessions for Polish forced laborers. His file described him as a "fanatical proponent of the Catholic Church and thus likely to cause unrest among the population."

After the war Father Scheipers returned to his pastoral work in his home diocese now located in the German Democratic Republic or East Germany. He was watched and investigated by the Stasi or secret police for continuing his same pattern of celebrating the sacraments. Thankfully Germany was reunified before they took action against him.

It is rather remarkable that the practice of the Catholic faith can be seen as so threatening in countries controlled by dictators or communist administrations. We perhaps underestimate the power of love or the value of spiritual belief or the compelling influence of moral authority. Evil can only be overcome by good, and in

many cases only after extended prayer and suffering.

The faithful witness of so many saints and martyrs, even within our own lifetimes, is a tremendous source of strength and encouragement for us as we face some of the challenges of our contemporary era. I pray that Catholics will always be on the side of goodness, truth, and the sanctity of life, even in the face of growing secularization, terrorism, and isolationism.

Please remember that Vacation Bible School is this week from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon, Monday through Friday, in the activity center and classrooms. Please watch out for the children and be extra careful in the parking lot during drop off and pick up. I know the kids will have a great time getting together with their friends and classmates for a fun week of activities. 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"He replied to him, 'You have answered correctly; do this and you will live." In today's Gospel a scholar questions Jesus about how to gain eternal life. In case anyone ever wonders whether heaven is within reach, one only needs to refer to this Gospel. Jesus provides a clear answer that gives us a clear plan of action: We are to love God with all that we are, and also to love our neighbors. Really, it's that simple.

The scholar, however, complicated things to make himself look better. Instead of accepting the simplicity of Jesus' instruction, he wanted to split hairs, asking, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied with the story of the Good Samaritan-and the lesson that our neighbors are not just those we know or love. Rather, our neighbor is the person that needs our help, the person whom we would rather ignore, the person whom God puts in our path. In short, everyone is our neighbor and we are called to treat everyone with mercy. This is part of how we gain eternal life But this flows from the first element of Jesus' answer. First and foremost, Jesus instructs us to love God "with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind." When we love God in this way, truly as the Lord of our life, then loving our neighbors becomes the easy part. When our hearts and minds are full of the love of God-who loves all people-then it will necessarily follow that we too will desire to share that love with others and not count the cost.

The Good Samaritan is an excellent example of this kind of love. Without hope of repayment, he gave of his time and his money to help the poor victim. But in return, the Samaritan will surely "gain eternal life."
