Dear Parishioners.

How times have changed regarding religious affiliation and the U.S. Supreme Court. Until the Reagan Administration, there was usually only one Catholic justice and never more than two serving on the Court at the same time. More often than not, Catholics tended to follow one another in their appointment to the "Catholic seat" on the Court. Edward Douglass White, from Louisiana, was one of those Catholics who served as associate justice from 1894 – 1910, and chief justice from 1910 – 1921.

The landscape began to shift in the 1980's when President Reagan appointed Antonin Scalia in 1986 and Anthony Kennedy in 1988 to join fellow Catholic William Brennan on the Court. Brennan retired in 1990 but then the first President Bush appointed Clarence Thomas, and President George W. Bush appointed both John Roberts and Samuel Alito to the Court. Finally, President Obama appointed Sonia Sotomayor to the Court in 2009, giving the Court six Catholic justices including the chief justice.

Neil Gorsuch was appointed in 2017 to fill the vacancy created by Antonin Scalia's death. Gorsuch was raised Catholic but now attends the Episcopal Church. However, at least one commentator reports that Gorsuch still identifies as Catholic. Our latest nominee, yet to be confirmed, is Brett Kavanaugh, who is visibly active in practicing his Catholic faith. So in many ways the "Catholic seat" has now become the "Catholic Court." The remaining three justices by the way are all Jewish.

Of course we Catholics are a very diverse group and do not always see eye to eye on political issues. One would hope that the justices share a love for our country and the greatest respect for the Constitution. And sometimes looking at issues from different angles and perspectives can result in a better ruling. We pray that their Catholic faith helps to guide their deliberations in their search for justice.

We will celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick in two weeks on Saturday, August 4, immediately following the 4:30 p.m. Vigil Mass. Any person who is seriously ill because of sickness, old age, or injury may be anointed. The illness may be either physical or mental and can include addictions. Anointing is also allowed prior to undergoing surgery. Please spread the word to your family and friends who may be in need of the healing graces provided through this special sacrament. And please pray for your fellow parishioners who are hospitalized, homebound, or struggling with cancer or some other serious illness.

I will be on vacation from Monday, July 23, through Wednesday, August 1. I am heading to Quebec City to soak up some of its fascinating history and culture. My French is very rusty but I intend to give it a try while I am there. Who knows, God is full of surprises and maybe I can retrieve more than I think. 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Now what?" It's a difficult thing to hear, isn't it? The train comes late, a child unexpectedly cries, and the latest public policy debate flares up in the news. Life throws us curveballs, and we have no choice but to adapt. Jesus and the Apostles find themselves in that exact situation in today's Gospel.

The Apostles have returned from their two-by-two missionary journey. As Jesus hears all of their stories, he knows they need time to recover and refresh. "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while." Their wilderness retreat is short-lived, however, as eager crowds discover their location. Jesus is well aware of the needs of his disciples. Still, as he looks out at the crowd, "His heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd." The rest break is over. "He began to teach them many things." For those of us who have experienced a taste of muchneeded relaxation only to have it taken away abruptly, perhaps we surmise what the Apostles might have been feeling in that moment. But Jesus isn't being inconsiderate of the Apostles needs. He offers them -- and us -- a lived lesson. St. John Paul II wrote, "The whole of Christ's life was a continual teaching: his silences, his miracles, his gestures, his prayer, his love for people, his special affection for the little and the poor, his acceptance of the total sacrifice on the Cross for the redemption of the world" (On Catechesis in Our Time, 9). In Jesus' choice to teach, we see all of these things: sacrificial love, concern for the marginalized, and priority of people's needs over personal preference. These aren't abstract ideals. They're lived realities as we strive to live and love like Jesus. When a new obstacle confronts you in your life, how do you respond?
