Dear Parishioners,

We are nearing the end of the Easter season and so we pause this weekend to reflect on the mystery of our Lord's Ascension to heaven. Jesus, in his glorified body, now sits enthroned at the right hand of God the Father. He watches over his Church in fulfillment of his promise to remain with us until the end of time.

Next Sunday is the Feast of Pentecost when we celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles and the beginning of the Church. We are called to continue the universal mission of the Church by bearing witness to the saving love of Christ in our own day and time. The Holy Spirit breathes the very life of Christ into us so that we can share his love with others.

One might assume that the extroverts among us would make the best witnesses and missionaries. Parishioners who are talkative and outgoing by nature are well-suited for ministries such as reading at Mass, teaching catechism, and mentoring youth. But the Holy Spirit dwells in all of us regardless of our personality type and makes use of our unique gifts to further God's holy work. A person who is more introverted will have a different way of proclaiming the scriptures and teaching the faith. Different styles appeal to different people and the Church needs all of us to carry out its mission.

I say this as an encouragement to all of you to either stay or become involved with one or more of the ministries offered through our parish or diocese. Ministry flows naturally from our worship and has a way of making prayer and the sacraments even more meaningful. Big projects like Vacation Bible School and the *Feast on the Levee* will only be successful insofar as a great number of us of all ages come together to pool our talent.

Mark your calendars for our annual Ministry Appreciation Dinner to be held on Saturday, June 28, beginning at 5:30 p.m. in the parish activity center. The dinner is our way of thanking all of you who contribute to the vitality of our parish through serving in one of our various ministries. This includes liturgical ministries such as music, décor, ushers, altar servers, lec-

ors and Eucharistic ministers; Christian formation catechists and Sacramental preparation leaders; Feast workers; Bereavement Committee volunteers; Homebound and hospital visitation; Zippers; Food Bank; K.C.'s, Catholic Daughters; Altar Society; Cemetery Committee; and any others I may have missed.

By the way, we will have a training session for new altar servers, lectors, Eucharistic ministers, and ushers later this summer on Tuesday, July 22. Boys and girls entering the 5th grade and above are eligible to become altar servers so please speak to your child about serving. We also need someone to coordinate our reception committee which provides refreshments on about four occasions annually. We have a faithful group of volunteers who are willing to help as long as we can identify someone to coordinate their efforts. Please give consideration to filling this need.

Finally, our Catholic Daughters and Knights of Columbus invite everyone to spend an hour in prayer and adoration before the Blessed Sacrament this first Friday, June 6, starting at 8:00 p.m. and ending just prior to our 8:00 a.m. first Saturday Mass.

7th Sunday of Easter

"Everything of mine is yours and everything of yours is mine." Jesus spoke these words while praying to his Father in heaven. What a perfect image of unity! Nothing stands as a barrier between the Father and the Son. They share everything. We can imagine the sort of divine harmony that exists between them. And then, we can ask ourselves whether we help foster that kind of harmony with those around us.

We are made in God's image, after all. We are supposed to "look" like God. Are we willing to share with our family, friends, and neighbors like God the Father and God the Son do with one another? Do we ever draw the line at what is "mine"? My time, my money, my house, my plans...we can easily rationalize our selfishness. But we were built for something much more beautiful: to reflect who God is through who we are. We are meant to be like walking mirrors of the divine likeness. It's our job to keep the mirror clean, however. When we are selfish or possessive, we smudge the reflection of God. The three persons of the Blessed Trinity--Father, Son, and Holy Spirit--are perfectly generous with one another. They even share their glory, as Jesus says today: "Give glory to your son, so that your son may glorify you."

Do we share our glory? When we accomplish something, do we recognize the people who helped along the way? Do we acknowledge God who gave us our talents, our skills, and our abilities in the first place? Jesus says to his Father, "Everything you gave me is from you." And this is true for us as well. Everything we have, down to life itself, comes from God. May we strive to be as generous with others as God has been with us.
