Dear Parishioners,

Please pray for two of our priests who are on medical leave and temporarily unable to minister in their parishes. The first is Father Phil Spano, a well-loved former pastor of St. John the Baptist, who misjudged a step and fell while distributing communion at Mass two weeks ago at his parish of Most Blessed Sacrament. Father Phil underwent surgery to repair a torn ligament in his leg and knee, and now begins a lengthy period of recovery and physical therapy. He is expected to be out for several months.

The second priest is Father Jack Nutter, pastor of St. Louis King of France Church in Baton Rouge and a member of my priests support group. Father Nutter is also well-loved by his parishioners and was granted a medical leave to address some health issues which were interfering with his ministry. No time table was provided for his leave so I imagine it will be anywhere from a few weeks to several months.

The Diocese doesn't really have any extra priests available to step in and cover these two parishes while their pastors are out on medical leave. Deacon Don Musso has been assigned as temporary parish life coordinator of Most Blessed Sacrament Parish and Father Trey Nelson has been assigned as temporary administrator of St. Louis Parish. Father Nelson, Father Mike Collins, and Father Philip Eapen, CMI, will handle the Masses at St. Louis, and a yet to be determined team of retired and active priests will celebrate the Masses at Most Blessed Sacrament.

This is an example of why the Bishop felt it timely to establish the *Pastoral Planning Task Force* that I mentioned in last Sunday's bulletin. This working group of priests, consecrated religious, and lay leaders is charged with studying the demographics of our Diocese in order to come up with strategies for meeting the present and future needs of our local Church. Members of the *Task Force* will meet with a representative group of our parishioners at the end of this month to see what ideas we may contribute to the formulation of a strategic plan.

Could St. John the Baptist eventually be combined with Holy Family and served by just one priest? It's

possible but it would mean sacrifice by all parties. Each of our two parishes would have to drop from four weekend Masses to just two Masses at each church. Canon law limits the number of Masses a priest may celebrate to two on weekdays and three on Sundays and holy days of obligation. That is why most parishes only have one Mass on weekdays—so as to allow for the priest to celebrate a second Mass in the case of a wedding or funeral. Saturday morning Masses have also disappeared by necessity in order for the priest to be able to celebrate a wedding or funeral in addition to his Saturday Vigil Mass.

Thankfully, we don't have to face these challenges all by ourselves. Jesus has promised to be with his Church until the end of the age, and we trust that he is faithful to his promises. Still, we want to be attentive to the activity of the Holy Spirit within the Church during this time of discernment because so often God works through human instruments. Pray that priests and laity may be open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we plan for a future full of hope.

12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Who then is this whom even wind and sea obey?" Incredible. Unbelievable. Miraculous. What a sight to behold. If only we had been there with those disciples! What a help it would be to our wavering faith to see Jesus calm the waves. Could we ever doubt again that he was Lord of all creation after a moment like that?

Well ... maybe. These remarkable moments do have a way of losing their luster from a distance. In retrospect, we too often second-guess such episodes of spiritual clarity: "Perhaps it was just a coincidence. Maybe the storm was about to end anyway. How can we know for sure?" In fact, it appears as though the disciples themselves were already struggling with forgetting the power of the signs they had previously seen. This is why Jesus reprimands them because of their fear, "Do you not yet have faith?"

Why does Jesus expect them to have faith already? Because, as Mark's Gospel records for us, Jesus had already cured countless people, cast out demons for all to see, and even had a divine voice announce at his baptism, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased," (1:11). The miracles were not in short supply. The problem was believing in the miracles even after they were over.

Let's not fall prey to the same problem, thirsting for other miracles than the ones we have already experienced in our own lives, subtle though they may have been. Let's not make our faith dependent upon the appearance of the next sign from God. No. Let us join the psalmist in maintaining an attitude of belief, as we thank the Lord for "his wondrous deeds to the children of men."
