Dear Parishioners,

Thank you for responding so generously to the Mission Appeal of Fr. Steve Rodrigues on behalf of the Capuchin Franciscans of Goa, India. The collection raised over \$6,000 and Father Steve was very grateful for your prayers and support. He will remain in our Diocese for another two weeks or so before returning home.

I enjoyed my brief trip to San Antonio in order to attend the 50th Anniversary of Religious Profession of Sister Dianne Heinrich, CDP, who had worked in our Diocese for many years. Father John Carville and Father Donald Blanchard also made the trip, and we were able to enjoy several good meals together while we were there.

Sister Dianne's Congregation of Divine Providence was founded in 1762 in Lorraine, France. The sisters were invited to Texas in 1866 by the Bishop of Galveston so that they might open schools for the growing Catholic population. At that time the Diocese of Galveston covered the entire state of Texas.

Her jubilee Mass was celebrated in the beautiful chapel of Our Lady of the Lake University which was founded in 1895 by the sisters. During the Mass and Renewal of Vows, the sisters and choir sang the *Suscipe*, a song traditionally sung at the profession of religious vows. *Suscipe* is the Latin word for receive. It is often associated with a famous prayer written by St. Ignatius of Loyola in the 16th century but its history and use is much older.

Here is the English translation of the Latin text sung by the sisters in San Antonio: "Receive me, O Lord, according to your word, and I shall live; and I will not be disappointed in my expectations." One can see why it is such an appropriate prayer to be sung at the profession of vows and at anniversaries. It is a response in faith to a call from God, and an expression of trust in God's ongoing providence.

Benedictine monks also pray the *Suscipe* at their entrance into a monastic community. For the remainder of their lives they will live in one place and devote themselves to work and prayer. Please remember that

we will take a second collection next weekend, July 2-3, to benefit our local community of Benedictines at St. Joseph Abbey and Seminary College as they recover from flood damage. The monks were finally able to move back into the Abbey church for Mass and prayer just last weekend.

This Thursday, June 30, is the deadline to register for Vacation Bible School without incurring a late fee. Also, please note that we will not have our monthly twelve hour adoration this Friday evening and Saturday morning, July 1-2, due to the upcoming Fourth of July holiday. However, we will celebrate our first Saturday morning Mass as usual at 8:00 a.m. on July 2.





13th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God." What have we left behind? What have we traded in to become faithful followers of Christ?

The answer is different for all of us. Some of us can tell the tale of a dramatic conversion story, leaving behind a life of blatantly selfish indulgence or obviously sinful behavior in order to embrace the call of Jesus. Others of us have been Christians since the day of our baptism as infants and have always walked the path of belief, but perhaps can trace certain moments when we embraced a deeper commitment and resolved to abandon particular behaviors, relationships, or worldly priorities that were in conflict with our faith. Whatever the case, Jesus instructs us today not to look to "what was left behind." Instead, we are called to keep our focus on what lies ahead, namely, life in Christ and the ultimate hope of union with him in heaven.

Keeping this focus can be quite a challenge. So often, it's tempting to think that the grass is greener somewhere else. As Christians, we can fall into the trap of imagining that it might feel better to be ... something else. Perhaps, seeing others around us whose lives are not shaped by their faith, we might think they have it easier than we do. Or perhaps we get lost in reminiscence about the way things were in the good old days, and thus get distracted from the mission that stands in front of us today. But thoughts like these are not fit for our new life as disciples of Christ. As St. Paul says in today's epistle, "For freedom Christ set us free." May we embrace the gift of this true freedom and follow Christ without looking back.
