Dear Parishioners,

On Thursday, June 18, 2015, Pope Francis released his second encyclical entitled *Laudato Si*, subtitled "On Care for Our Common Home." I have not had a chance to read or study the document yet, but I thought I might give some background on encyclicals in general and how we as Catholics should receive this current letter.

The word encyclical means "circular letter," and refers to a formal pastoral letter written by the pope and addressed to the universal Church, and in recent times, to all people of good will. They are typically written in Latin and take their title from the opening words of the letter. *Laudato Si* (translated "Be Praised") is a little different in that it is written in Italian and takes its name from the "Canticle of the Sun" by St. Francis of Assisi.

Papal encyclicals are the ordinary means by which a pope teaches and guides the members of the Church. They do not carry the same weight as dogmatic pronouncements, but nonetheless guide the faithful to a deeper understanding of the faith and its implications for daily living. Pope Benedict XVI wrote three encyclicals and St. John Paul II wrote fourteen encyclicals during their respective pontificates.

Encyclicals often provoke mixed responses among Catholics depending on the subject matter and one's political affiliations. As much as it pains us to admit it, almost all Catholics are cafeteria Catholics in that we pick and choose which teachings to like and which to dismiss. In the 1960's for example, many Catholics were strongly divided in their opinions regarding *Mater et Magistra* (On Christianity and Social Progress, 1961), and *Humanae Vitae* (On the Regulation of Birth, 1968). Certain encyclicals align with our worldview while others cause discomfort by challenging our long-held assumptions.

Nonetheless, I am forever thankful that I belong to a Church that cannot be contained by any one political, economic, or social category. So many of these systems are restricted by time, circumstance, and prevailing beliefs while the Church transcends these human constructs. I have so often been convinced of my own

wisdom regarding some issue only to discover that the Church has a much broader and deeper appreciation of the human condition and God's divine plan for our ultimate happiness.

So whether you are conservative or liberal; Democrat, Republican, Tea Partier, or Independent; capitalist, socialist, or somewhere in between; whether black, white, Asian, Creole, Hispanic, Indian, or Cajun; I hope that you as a faithful Catholic will read *Laudato Si* with an open mind and heart. It is sent to us by a successor of St. Peter, a modern day Shepherd appointed to lead the Church and to keep us in union with Christ and one another. Our Catholic identity must take precedence over any of the other categories which we sometimes use to describe ourselves.

Finally, as a Catholic and an American, I wish all of you a very safe and happy Fourth of July next weekend!

"And they ridiculed him." So he hung his head in shame and slunk gloomily out the back door? So he pleaded and whined and called them all names? No. Instead, Jesus "put them all out" and went about his business, raising Jairus' daughter from the dead.

Jesus wasn't concerned about what others thought. And lest we imagine that everyone around him was constantly worshiping him and adoring his divinity, today's reading reminds us that even in the presence of the Lord, skeptics were a dime a dozen. So should we be surprised if we must deal with a bit of ridicule ourselves?

As faithful Christians, we will at times be called to chart a course that doesn't make sense in the eyes of the world. And, yes, some people will say we're crazy. We may be called to take a stand for the unborn or the elderly in a culture that considers life to be expendable. We may be faced with a decision at work that requires us to adhere to an ethical code that our boss thinks is laughable. Perhaps we will have to sacrifice a relationship because of pressures to ignore Christian morality. Or maybe the situation could be as simple as dealing with the smirks that arise when we say a prayer before eating at a restaurant.

Whether we face a snicker or blatant discrimination against our religious freedom, we should not flinch or waver when such opposition comes our way. Jesus faced it and so will we. The question is only how we will respond.

Today, Jesus gives us an example of calm confidence as he marches forward with his mission. He knew that he was doing the right thing, and that was enough for him. It should be enough for us too.
