Dear Parishioners,

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, formerly known as Corpus Christi. The feast began in the 13th century as a result of the devotion and visions of St. Juliana of Liége. Within the very short time frame of just 35 years, Pope Urban IV added the feast to the Church's universal calendar in 1264.

A feast celebrating Christ's gift of the Eucharist naturally calls to mind the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. However the mood is quite different since Holy Thursday also anticipates the suffering of Christ on Good Friday. By contrast, today's feast falls in the afterglow of the Easter season and the corresponding emphasis on the Risen Christ. How blessed we are to be nourished by the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

As I mentioned last week, I was ordained on Saturday, May 31, 1986, on the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. I then celebrated my first Mass on Sunday, June 1, 1986, which just happened to be the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ that year. I have celebrated Mass thousands of times since then, but I still have a special attachment to this feast day which was the occasion of my very first Mass.

This Friday, June 8, is the solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. This feast is celebrated each year on the third Friday after Pentecost. Devotions on this Friday originally focused on the wounds of Christ. Catholics of the Middle Ages drew strength through meditating on the suffering of Christ. Over time the focus shifted to the love of Christ as symbolized by his sacred heart. The statue of the Sacred Heart of Jesus above our main altar is a beautiful reminder of Jesus' unconditional love for his Church.

Please mark your calendars for our annual Ministry Appreciation Dinner to be held on Saturday, June 23, beginning at 5:30 p.m. in the parish activity center. The dinner is our way of thanking all of you who contribute to the vitality of our parish through serving in one of our various ministries. This includes liturgical ministries such as choir, décor, ushers, altar servers,

lectors, and Eucharistic ministers; Christian formation catechists and Sacramental preparation leaders; Feast workers; Bereavement Committee volunteers; Homebound and hospital visitation; Zippers; Food Bank; K.C.'s, Catholic Daughters; Altar Society; Cemetery Committee; and any others I may have missed. Please RSVP to the parish office so we can plan the meal.

Registration continues for this year's Vacation Bible School to be held July 9-13, 2018. Forms are available in the back of church as well as on our parish website, and the deadline to register without incurring a late fee is June 29 so don't delay. VBS is open to children in grades K through 5th so sign up your kids for a week of fun, faith-filled activities. We need teachers and aides as well as participants and the forms for adult and youth volunteers are also located on our website. VBS is a joint effort of Holy Family and St. John the Baptist Parishes.

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

In our modern times, symbol can seem to have lost its value. The most recognizable "signs" are ones we see on the road or the branding in advertisements. The logos for major companies don't do much more than perk our interest or disdain. They surely don't deliver on their promises for our lives to be happier, healthier, and easier.

On this feast of Corpus Christi, we hear the account of the Last Supper. This was Passover, an ancient sign of the covenant of Moses. The Hebrew people celebrated God's providential care for His people. To the listening disciples, Jesus makes a very bold claim. "This is my blood of the covenant." At the time of the first Passover -- the redemption of the Hebrew people from slavery to the Egyptians -- the blood of the sacrificial lamb was spread on the lintels of the doorpost. Tomorrow, some of the disciples would witness the blood of the new covenant spread across the wood of the cross.

Christ's Body and Blood are more than a sign. They are a sacrament. In the sacrament, the sign makes real what it signifies. More than ritual, a sacrament enacts truth of the covenantal love of God and His promise of fidelity. It's a promise God keeps. The same bread and wine of that first Holy Thursday liturgy becomes -- throughout the centuries and until the end of time -- the very Body and Blood of Christ. On this feast, we celebrate the unfailing covenantal love of our God. As you partake in the Eucharist today, and next Sunday, and the Sunday after that, remember that you receive neither a meaningless sign nor an empty offer. You receive God Himself, as He fulfills His promise to remain with us always.
