Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

It's a long Mass today. Palms and Passion all rolled into one. We rejoice and we become somber as we recall some of the most important events of our faith. Remember back in January when we read from the very beginning of Luke's Gospel. This is what he said: "Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as those who were eyewitnesses from the beginning and ministers of the word have handed them down to us, I too have decided, after investigating everything accurately anew, to write it down in an orderly sequence for you" (Lk 1:1-3).

Luke's orderly account has Jesus slowly making his journey to Jerusalem. Today's Mass brings that journey to an end, at least as far as our reading of Luke is concerned. To the acclaim of crowds, Jesus enters the city on a colt. But his journey eventually leads him to the Mount of Olives and then to Golgotha and finally to a rock-hewn tomb. We know that this is not the end of the story. There are still other events to be fulfilled. But we will have to wait until we get to Pentecost for that final chapter of Luke's narrative.

Like the Mass this weekend, our own journey through life can have its ups and downs. We can be filled with joy one moment and saddled with grief at another. Our Lord and Savior experienced the same. As a human person like us he had joyous times and sad ones as well. The same holds true for those eyewitnesses who Luke speaks of in the introduction to his Gospel. The ones who were with Jesus from the beginning also knew both sorrow and joy. They persisted in the faith, handing down the story of Christ to our day. And in our joys and in our sorrows we pass on the faith as well.

Dear Parishioners,

The official title for today's feast in our new Roman Missal is *Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord*. I imagine we will continue to call it Palm Sunday for brevity's sake, but the longer title reminds us that the central focus of Holy Week is always Christ's passion. We are all anxious to conclude the sobriety of Lent but we cannot afford to bypass this final stage of our annual Lenten journey. We unite ourselves with Christ's suffering on the cross in order to inherit the glorious crown he won for us.

The fourth week of Lent was a little different this year due to the election of a new Holy Father to lead our Church. The former Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio of Buenos Aires was chosen by his brother cardinals, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to succeed Pope Benedict who resigned for reasons of declining health. Pope Francis is the first pope from Latin America and the first Jesuit to be named a Pope. And of course, what really captured our imagination: he is the first Pope to choose the name *Francis*.

Elizabeth Scalia, who writes a blog entitled "The Anchoress," noted that "Pope Benedict took his name from Benedict of Nursia, the Father of Western Monasticism, and it is Western Monasticism that helped to restore civilization after the Dark Ages, largely by storing up its knowledge, creating a continuum for instruction and advancement. This pope takes his name from Francis, the church rebuilder who came along when we had balled ourselves up because of all we thought we knew. Seems right they should follow each other in papacy as in history. I read somewhere yesterday that 'Pope Benedict taught us what faith means, this pope will teach us how faith is lived.'"

John Allen, a well-respected journalist based in Rome, also writes a blog entitled "All Things Catholic." His commentary is similar and notes that "The former pope embraced Benedict as his patron, signifying a scholarly and quasi-monastic style. This pope has chosen Francis, suggesting an earthier and more popular way of living the faith, one that emphasizes closeness to the poor. Both Benedict and Francis were great reformers, but the approach is different."

We are a very large and diverse Church, with varying styles of prayer, and numerous opinions as to how we should practice and safeguard our treasured faith. Each pope possesses a unique personality, background, and style of leadership, and so different Catholics will naturally favor one pope over another. The bottom line though is something Pope Benedict expressed not long after the announcement of his resignation: "The Church belongs to Christ, whose care and guidance will never be lacking." I pray that the Good Shepherd will bless and strengthen Pope Francis as he begins his new ministry.

Please join us for our Holy Week! The Mass of the Lord's Supper is at 7:00 p.m. on Holy Thursday evening. The Way of the Cross will be prayed at 12:00 noon on Good Friday, followed by the Celebration of the Lord's Passion at 3:00 p.m. The Easter Vigil is at 8:00 p.m. Holy Saturday and the Masses on Easter Sunday morning follow the regular Sunday schedule.
