### 3rd Sunday of Lent

A few years ago a friend of mine was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor. Bill was a good man, very kind and generous with his time and his talents. And although he didn't have a lot of money (he was a teacher by profession) he was always ready to help out in any way that he could. As a middle-aged man, Bill was fairly healthy otherwise, and his diagnosis came as a shock to his family and friends. Most of us were left asking, "Why should such a cruel thing happen to such a kind man?"

This is the very question Jesus confronts in the Gospel this weekend when he deals with tragic events in his time. A tower collapses and eighteen people are killed. Is this punishment because they were the most evil people in Jerusalem? Some Galileans are slaughtered while offering sacrifice. Have they somehow offended God, and so are now being called to account for their wickedness? Jesus says that the evil that befell them makes them no guiltier than anyone else. And, by implication, makes the rest of us no less guilty!

Our sense of justice likes to have the punishment fit the crime. We expect that there will be specific consequences for individual actions, each wrongful act punished on its own merits. But the problem of evil is much greater than personal sinfulness. While we each have responsibility for our individual sins, we also carry the weight of human sinfulness. As Catholics, we call that original sin, but whatever title it is given, it is the recognition that there is at work in the world a greater sin than that which each of us may be personally guilty of. It is the sin of our race. Bill did not get cancer because he was a bad man. But illness, war, hatred, and every other evil are the things from which we seek deliverance. It is good that God is patient with us, like the gardener with the fig tree.

And he told them this parable: "There once was a person who had a fig tree planted in his orchard, and when he came in search of fruit on it but found none, he said to the gardener, 'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should it exhaust the soil?"" - Lk 13:6-7

Dear Parishioners,

We are approaching the halfway point of the Lenten season. If we started our 40 day count on the First Sunday of Lent, then Friday, March 8, is the 20<sup>th</sup> day. Now is a good time to rededicate ourselves to our Lenten practices and give God the time and opportunity needed to bring about positive changes in our lives.

Earlier this Lent at one of our weekday Masses, I mentioned the following strategy or aid for remaining faithful to your Lenten penances. Consider making a contract with yourself that each time you fail in keeping a resolution you place a dollar bill in one of the Operation Rice Bowl containers (which are still available in the back of church). I took that advice and I can attest that the financial incentive does add a nice element of pain and encouragement.

An alternative penalty for failure might be to remove two items of clothing from your closet and donate them to our parish thrift store run by the Zippers. In either case we will be helping our neighbor while also benefiting from our spiritual resolutions. So let's make the next twenty days of Lent especially productive in terms of our spiritual growth.

With that in mind, please try to go to confession sometime during the next three weeks if you have not already done so. It is important that we go before the start of Holy Week since opportunities for the sacrament are quite limited after Palm Sunday. You may wish to make it a family affair and all go the same afternoon or evening. The sacraments are very helpful to our spiritual development so take advantage of this channel of God's grace, especially if it has been a long time since your last confession.

Complacency is a particular enemy of personal and spiritual growth. It is defined as "self-satisfaction accompanied by unawareness of actual dangers or deficiencies." Unawareness is a type of "spiritual blindness" where we convince ourselves that we do not need to go to confession because we are not aware of any serious sins that we have committed. Prayer and examination of conscience help us to recognize the many times when we have failed to love our neighbor

as we should. Our family, friends, and co-workers are all very aware of our deficiencies so why don't we open our eyes and hearts and allow God to help us become better people this Easter.

In addition to the sacraments we are very fortunate to have a two-night Lenten Mission planned for our community beginning at 7:00 p.m. on this Third Sunday of Lent. I thank Father Michael Alello for being with us this weekend to celebrate all of our Masses in preparation for his evening presentations on Sunday and Monday nights. I am celebrating the Masses at his parish of St. Philomena in Labadieville this weekend but I will be back in time to enjoy one of the spaghetti dinners being served by the K.C.'s, and of course attend both nights of the parish mission. We will take a collection on the second night of the mission to help underwrite the cost of the mission and thank Father Alello. Please join us!
