Dear Parishioners,

On Thursday, March 19, 2015, St. John the Baptist Parish will celebrate 180 years as a faith community. Since the Eucharist is centered on the themes of *remembrance* and *thanksgiving*, it is important that we celebrate this anniversary and offer gratitude to God for his many blessings these last 180 years.

The signers of the 1835 act of incorporation had names like Hebert, Landry, Doiron, and LaBauve. Their descendants are among the families that worship here today. A strong sense of attachment to the land and to the faith is characteristic of a community that endures over many decades of change and growth.

A small anniversary committee led by Lucy Landry has put together a very nice program to mark our anniversary. They commissioned a large scale painting of the Acadian settlers gathered around our small Catholic Church as it might have appeared in the early 1800's. They also commissioned a skit to be performed by some of the children of our parish as a further way of celebrating our rich history.

The unveiling of the painting and the performance of the skit will both take place on the evening of Thursday, March 19, beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Parish Activity Center. The parish is also providing a meal that night so please call the parish office (749-2189) if you plan to attend so we can prepare enough food. The combined meal and program will last about two hours.

Our neighbors at Holy Family Parish and School have their annual "Bear Fair" on Friday and Saturday, March 20 and 21, 2015. Parent volunteers will be selling raffle tickets after all of our Masses next weekend, March 14-15. Please help support this important fundraiser and community builder for the school by purchasing tickets or attending the fair.

I continue to remind you of our four-night Lenten Mission to be held Sunday – Wednesday, March 22-25, beginning at 7:00 p.m. each night in the church. Our retreat director is Father Blaise Czaja, CP, and the theme for this year's mission is "On the Way to

Jesus Christ." Father Czaja will also celebrate an 8:00 a.m. morning Mass on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday mornings of the same week for the benefit of those who cannot attend the evening presentations. His morning talks will take the form of a twenty minute homily at each of the 8:00 a.m. Masses.

Please remember to include vocations to the priest-hood and consecrated religious life in your daily prayers for Lent and Easter. We recently lost two priests to untimely deaths: Father Clarence Waguespack died on December 8 in a freak bicycle accident and Father Than Vu died on January 28 after a long battle with cancer. We need to follow Jesus' command to "ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest" so that we will always have sufficient priests and religious to staff our parishes and schools.

3rd Sunday of Lent

"While he was in Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, many began to believe in his name when they saw the signs he was doing." How we would love to see those signs! How easy it would be for us to believe if we too could witness Jesus healing the sick, feeding the multitudes, calming the storm. It's tempting to imagine that faith was a simple thing back in those days. We might be inclined to think that we don't have the same benefits as those first believers, and so faith is harder in our day and age. But is it, really? In truth, we have an advantage that none of those people had: two thousand years of Church history! Two millennia of faithful, prayerful Christians believing in Jesus and spreading the Gospel; the collective witness of the saints-many of whom have also worked "signs" in Jesus' name; the effects of the Church on culture and the world through its schools, its hospitals, its spiritual movements, and religious institutions; the unbroken line of apostolic succession that traces back to the time of Christ. Just the fact alone that the Church is still alive and well in spite of all of its sinful members ought to be miracle enough for us.

But even with all of this testimony, it's important to remember that seeing signs and believing in Jesus are not the same thing. Even those who witnessed Jesus' miracles had to take the next step by choosing to accept him as their Lord. Ultimately, all of these convincing details are not the point. The point is to encounter Jesus on a personal level. The signs may open the door to bring us closer to him, but it's up to us to walk through that door. May we walk so as to come "to believe the Scripture."
