Dear Parishioners,

As Catholics, we rejoice at the upcoming ordination of three new priests for our Diocese next Saturday, May 30, at 10:00 a.m. at St. Joseph Cathedral. The three being ordained are *Brad Doyle*, who interned here one summer under Father Matt Dupre, *Reuben Dykes*, originally from Covington but who served one summer at Holy Family Parish, and *Matthew Graham*, a professional engineer who resigned from his work to answer God's call to the priesthood.

The soon to be Father Brad Doyle will celebrate his First Mass at 4:00 p.m. that same day, May 30, at St. George Church. Father Reuben Dykes will celebrate his First Mass at 12:00 noon on May 31 at St. Joseph Cathedral. Father Matthew Graham will celebrate his First Mass at 11:30 a.m. on May 31 at St. Jude Church. We are anxiously awaiting word from Bishop Muench regarding their first parish assignments.

Father Brad Doyle at 27 years of age will become the youngest priest in the Diocese. The title of oldest priest is held by Msgr. William Greene who is 89 years old. The rest of us fall somewhere in between these two, but I imagine we are weighted on the high or old side. So please continue your good prayers for more vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated religious life. Make the effort to plant good seeds of encouragement in the hearts of our young parishioners so that they might be open to God's call.

We welcome some young adult missionaries from our Baton Rouge Diocese who are visiting this weekend, May 23-24, to speak to us about their upcoming trip to Honduras. This is the same organization that visited our parish in March 2012 and they are here to once again ask for our prayers and material support for this year's mission. I thank you in advance for your kind and prayerful support of their mission.

Registration forms are now available in the back of church for this year's Vacation Bible School to be held July 13-17, 2015. VBS is open to children in grades K through 5<sup>th</sup> so sign up your kids for a week of fun, faith-filled activities. We need teachers and aides as well as participants and the forms for adult and youth volunteers are also located in the back of

church. VBS is a joint effort of Holy Family and St. John the Baptist Parishes.

Our parish activity center receives a great deal of use throughout the year and we recently noticed that it was looking a little worn. In response, we just added a fresh coat of paint to the interior doors and columns. We also replaced the carpet on the stage underneath the stained glass window. Our next project is to professionally repair some of the pews and kneelers in the church.

The church office will be closed on Monday, May 25, for Memorial Day, and again on Wednesday, May 27, for our annual Staff Planning Day. This is the time of year when we review the calendar and set dates for the upcoming fall and spring. Enjoy this Memorial Day weekend.

### **Pentecost Sunday**

"Rivers of living water will flow from within him who believes in me.' He said this in reference to the Spirit." Rivers of living water. What does this image make us think of? Something active. Something dynamic and changing, yet constant and dependable. A river with living water is not stagnant; it is not silent, but rather it speaks. This river is not mucky or full of algae. This river is clear, beautiful, refreshing, and life-giving. It draws people to its banks by providing the kind of water that sustains life and the kind of scenery that is a joy to behold.

Those who believe in Jesus will be like this river. Through the Spirit of Christ, which first came upon Christian believers at Pentecost and which came upon us at our baptism, we become a source of "living water." Instead of being motionless, dull, murky, unproductive people, we are strengthened by God's power to be dynamic, refreshing, and life-giving.

This isn't automatic, however. We must cooperate with the Spirit that has been given to us. Those of us who have received confirmation have been sacramentally gifted with the fullness of the Spirit, but that doesn't mean that the living water is flowing at full speed. As St. Paul wrote in his second letter to Timothy, we need to "stir into flame the gift of God" (1:6). The flame may be there, but if we don't fan it through prayer, virtuous living, spiritual formation, and frequent reception of the sacraments, then it will never burst forth with the full power that it could have. But let us take heart! Even this process of "fanning" is made easier when we call upon the Holy Spirit to help us. For St. Paul reminds us today that "the Spirit too comes to the aid of our weakness."
