Dear Parishioners,

Our parish office will be closed on Monday in honor of Memorial Day, a day to remember all of the men and women who died while serving in our country's armed forces. We offer special prayers for all of our parishioners and family members who died in service to our country.

As Catholics, we also note the many Catholic priests who were killed while serving as chaplains, including several Medal of Honor recipients and two who are being considered for sainthood.

Father Emil Kapaun was born in 1916 in the small Czech farming community of Pilsen, Kansas. Ordained in 1940, he volunteered for the U.S. Army Chaplain Corps in 1944 and served until 1946. He then reenlisted in 1948 and was among the first troops sent to Korea in 1950. He was with the 8th Calvary Regiment of the 1st Calvary Division during the Battle of Unsan, and chose to remain with the wounded rather than escape when they were overrun. He died on May 23, 1951 as a prisoner of war in North Korea. His heroism wasn't fully known until the release and testimony of his fellow POW's two years later in 1953.

Father Vincent Capodanno, MM, was born in 1929 in Staten Island, New York. He was ordained a priest as a member of the Maryknolls in 1958. He then joined the U.S. Navy as a chaplain in 1965 and volunteered for duty in Vietnam where he was assigned to the Marine Corps, 3d Battalion. Though wounded several times himself, he continued to drag others to safety and minister to the wounded until he was killed in action on September 4, 1967.

This Thursday, May 31, is the 32nd Anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood. I give thanks to God for my vocation and for the privilege of serving Him as a Catholic priest. I think I still have a few good years left in me, but I continue to pray that one or two young men from our parish will hear God's call to serve the Church as priests.

Vacation Bible School is July 9-13 this year so be sure to mark your calendars and come enjoy a week's

activities with classmates and friends. We need teachers and aides as well as participants so all are invited to join us. As you know, VBS is a joint effort of Holy Family and St. John the Baptist Parishes and that always adds to the fun. Registration forms are available in the back of church or you may call the Christian Formation Office at 749-3387 for more information.

Today is the last day to nominate one or more of your fellow parishioners to serve on our Parish Pastoral Council. The forms may either be mailed to the church office or placed in the collection basket. The three new members will then be chosen at the June 13 meeting of the Council. They will serve three year terms beginning with the September 2018 meeting.

Lastly, our Catholic Daughters and Knights of Columbus invite everyone to spend an hour in prayer and adoration before the Blessed Sacrament this First Friday, June 1, starting at 8:00 p.m. and ending just prior to our 8:00 a.m. First Saturday Mass.

Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

Happy Trinity Sunday! In today's Gospel, we hear Jesus declare together all three Persons of the Trinity. "Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

When we speak of the Trinity, two different theological words are sometimes used: immanent and economic. The immanent Trinity is the life of the three Persons within themselves, the inner harmonious relationship between Father, Son, and Spirit. We see this in the Gospels when Jesus speaks of his Father and promises to send the Holy Spirit. The term "economic" has its roots in the Greek word oikonomia, roughly meaning "household management." The economic Trinity is our three-Personed God's relationship with creation; it is creation and redemption and ongoing relationship with us.

Made in the image and likeness of God, we are called to imitate God's immanence by giving and receiving love with one another in community. However, this is not limited only to those close to us, though that's where love often starts. We also imitate the economy of God when we go out, when we extend our love and care in a life-giving way. "Go therefore?"

Every believer is sent on mission. Every believer is invited to follow Jesus and the Apostles "to the nations," to the margins, to the people who require a little extra reach. This could be a distant relative, the residents of your local homeless shelter or even the forgotten neighbor next door! When we love well, we create something beautiful-a relationship, a holy moment, a foretaste of heaven. This Trinity Sunday, take some time to examine the relationships in your life. How well do you love those nearest to you? How well do you reach out to those farther away? How are you creating something beautiful?
