Dear Parishioners,

I will be away from the parish all of this week, May 6-10, attending the Spring Formation Study Days with all of the priests of the Baton Rouge Diocese. Our theme this year is "The Biblical Roots of Priestly Prayer," and our presenter is Dr. Brant Pitre, professor of sacred scripture at Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans. Dr. Pitre is a native of Houma and has become quite well-known nationally as a teacher, speaker, and author.

Priests are required to attend at least one week of continuing formation annually. This is in addition to an annual retreat that all priests make. The purpose of continuing education is to stay current in one's field and in the case of priests to deepen our knowledge and understanding of theology and ministry. Study days also allow time for prayer and fraternity with brother priests, which is essential to maintaining unity with one another and with the Lord. Our time together strengthens our priestly identity and helps us to see our ministry as a shared ministry under the leadership of our bishop and the Holy Father.

Since the Study Days are mandatory for all priests, we will not be able to have daily Mass this week. The priests who I sometimes call to celebrate Mass in my absence will also be attending the study days, so we will have Communion Services in place of the Masses this week. Bishop Muench has also asked that funerals be scheduled after the study days are over if possible, or that one of our deacons celebrate the funeral without a Mass.

We typically rotate the location for our study days and this year we are meeting in my hometown of Metairie. One of the reasons we sometimes hold these gatherings outside of our own diocese is to encourage priests to leave their work behind for a few days in order to give their full attention to their spiritual and professional growth. Some priests are workaholics and tend to run back to their parishes to celebrate Mass, check messages, and return phone calls or emails. While they may be admired for their hard work, their effectiveness is diminished over time and eventually their health and happiness begins to decline.

Happiness and holiness usually go hand in hand, and the priestly vocation is too important to leave to chance. If we are not actively engaged in deepening our relationship with the Lord and with our brother priests, then we are on the path to isolation and dissatisfaction with our ministry. So please pray for us that these days might be a time of spiritual growth and communion.

Finally, we are blessed with a very beautiful church and campus here at St. John the Baptist. To help maintain our parish facilities, and to promote a sense of community among us, I would like to start having two work days a year, one in the spring and one in the fall, so that we can better care for our spiritual home. The first Work Day will take place in two weeks, on Saturday, May 18, beginning at 8:00 a.m., so please write it on your calendar. We will focus on the flower beds and grounds this time so dress appropriately for the outdoors. All ages are welcome!

6th Sunday of Easter

The housing market is often used as a leading indicator of economic recovery because so much money is invested in this segment of the economy. Construction of new homes provides jobs, and the purchase of existing homes leads to additional consumer spending as homeowners move in, repair, and renovate. Analysts use a baseline that they consider a "normal" market, and then measure improvement from there. In the dark days of the housing collapse five years ago new construction starts were less than one-third the desired level of 1.5 million a month. Just three years ago, mortgage delinquency and foreclosure rates were almost triple what is considered an acceptable rate of 5.25%. These are dark and dismal figures if you are a banker or construction worker.

In the Gospel this weekend Jesus is speaking to his disciples at the Last Supper describing the relationship between himself and the Father and the Holy Spirit. Those who love Jesus will keep his word and he and the Father will come and make their dwelling with the disciple. This image of dwelling speaks to the abiding presence of God in the followers of Jesus. God is always with them.

Owning a home was long considered a part of the American dream. If a family could purchase a place of their own, then they would consider themselves to have "made it." Home ownership is still a value many people cling to, but its luster has dimmed since the collapse of the housing market. We are six Sundays away from Easter now, and maybe the joy of that feast has also dimmed a bit in our hearts. Maybe we've slipped back into some of our usual patterns and lost some of the fervor of our baptismal commitment. Even the Christian life is occasionally subject to a certain buyer's remorse. Jesus tells us in the Gospel not to be troubled or afraid. He and the Father are with us in a dwelling that is forever.
