Dear Parishioners,

The "Rite of Acceptance" will take place at the 9:00 a.m. Mass next Sunday, the Solemnity of Christ the King, for this year's R.C.I.A. candidates who are inquiring into the Catholic faith. The Rite of Acceptance is the first of several thresholds that our inquirers cross as they discern entrance into the Catholic Church.

During this Rite the candidates are marked with the sign of the cross over their foreheads, ears, eyes, lips, hearts, shoulders, hands, and feet. The sign of the cross represents the immensity of Christ's love and strength, even as it invites us to a deeper level of discipleship and friendship with the Lord. This is a dynamic of faith for all followers of Christ that we continually discover throughout our lives.

Since faith formation is a lifelong process, please mark your calendars for an "Advent Morning of Reflection" to be led by Father Brian Webre, CJC, on Saturday, December 6, 2014. The program will begin with the first Saturday Mass at 8:00 a.m., followed by coffee and donuts in the activity center, and then a talk by Father Webre. The reflection will focus on the Advent call to "*Prepare the Way of the Lord*," and the morning schedule will also include the opportunity for confession. The program will end no later than 12:00 noon.

Father Brian Webre, CJC, grew up in New Orleans and Mandeville and began his studies for the priesthood as a seminarian for the Archdiocese of New Orleans. He later discerned a call to join the *Community of Jesus Crucified*, a small religious community based in the Diocese of Lafayette. He was ordained to the priesthood on May 26, 2014 at St. John the Evangelist Cathedral in Lafayette.

A newly ordained priest provides a beautiful witness to Christ's ongoing care for his Church by sending new priests to work in his vineyard. Religious vocations are not where we wish they would be in terms of numbers, but the quality of our newly ordained priests is very inspiring. They will undoubtedly make some mistakes in their first years of ministry, but that doesn't diminish the energy and blessings they bring to our church. Youthful exuberance is balanced by wisdom and ex-

perience, so we have also booked an older priest to lead our Lenten Mission this year. Father Blaise Czaja, CP, a Passionist priest, will be here March 22-25, 2015 to lead a four-night Parish Mission for us. Father Czaja ("**chai**-ah") was born and raised in Port Arthur, Texas, and recently celebrated 50 years as a priest. We look forward to benefitting from the insights he has gained in those 50 years of prayer and service.



33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

"A man going on a journey called in his servants and entrusted his possessions to them." In today's Gospel parable, this man represents God, and the servants represent us. The story makes a clear point about the importance of putting the gifts God has given us to good use. Unlike the first two servants, the third servant chose not to make a return on his "talent." Thus we can understand the frustration of the master. He trusted this servant, and the fellow let him down. Remember, this all began with an act of trust when the master handed over care of his things. The fact is that the third servant did not take good care of what he was given.

What have we been given? Some gifts from God we all share in common: life and salvation. But others differ from person to person. We each have our own set of "talents": our personal skills, our material blessings, our education, family background, and so on. Some have more, and some have fewer. But the point is that we are called to make the most of what we have, whatever that may be.

Perhaps the starting point for making a return on God's investment in us is to recognize that what we have is really his! In a sense, our gifts and skills, even our lives, are all "on loan" from God. He is generous in sharing his life and his blessings with us. And, like the parable's master, he is quick to praise and reward our efforts. But when we choose to be "wicked, lazy" servants, taking everything for granted and not using our gifts for God's glory, then "even what [we have] will be taken away." What we bury underground is as good as gone. So let's bring our gifts into the light of day by sharing them with others and making the best possible use of all we've received.
