Dear Parishioners,

Nearly all of the numbers have now been tabulated for this year's *Feast on the Levee* and our net income looks to be around \$55,300. Thank you very much for all that you did to contribute to our success through the sale of raffle tickets, the donation of auction items, and the preparation of food. Thanks once again to Natalie Palermo and all who worked so hard to benefit our Church and community.

In addition, we are blessed in that we do not have to apply any of this year's fair proceeds to loan repayment! The great majority of the income will be deposited into our building fund savings and our regular parish savings. I earmarked a small amount, about \$1600, to purchase a new silver ciborium and a new gold ciborium for our church. (A ciborium is the covered container used to store the consecrated hosts in the tabernacle.) The new ciboria will match the silver and gold chalices that we use during the course of the liturgical year.

The #iGiveCatholic online fundraising drive will take place this Tuesday, November 27, 2018 from 12:01 a.m. – 11:59 p.m. Our goal for the day is to collect enough donations to purchase new **hymnals** for our church. Friends and parishioners of St. John the Baptist Church will be able to use their credit cards to help us achieve our goal. This Friday evening and Saturday morning, November 30 & December 1, is the monthly all-night Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament led by our Catholic Daughters and Knights of Columbus. The twelve hour period begins at 8:00 p.m. Friday evening and ends with 8:00 a.m. Mass on Saturday morning. A schedule is available in the back of church if you would like to sign-up for an hour of prayer and adoration in the presence of our Lord.

Next Sunday is the First Sunday of Advent and the beginning of a new liturgical season and year. The unique season of Advent challenges us to slow down even as our secular, commercial culture urges us to speed up. The candles of our Advent wreath remind us that a

light is coming into the world at Christmas, and so we prepare by watching, waiting, and praying.

Catholic writer and speaker Danielle Bean writes "Peace on earth is what Jesus promises to bring us at Christmastime. If you have a family, though, the weeks leading up to December 25 can feel anything but peaceful. Besides the shopping, decorating, visiting, cooking, and other preparations we make during Advent, there is the world at large that can feel at odds with a message of peace...What kind of peace can Jesus bring to a world like ours? Perhaps precisely the kind we need."

Saturday, December 8, is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception and a holy day of obligation. We will celebrate a Mass at 9:00 a.m. on December 8 in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary, patroness of the United States of America under her title as the Immaculate Conception.



Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

If you brought your child to the restroom during the Liturgy of the Word, you might walk away with one of two interpretations of Jesus as King. The first and second readings are bold and victorious. We see Christ coming on the clouds for the final judgment of heaven and earth. The Gospel sets a very different tone. Jesus is under arrest and facing death before Pontius Pilate. We know how this story will end. So if Christ is King, what does it mean? Is he a glorious conqueror or a suffering servant?

"My kingdom does not belong to this world." Here is the heart of Jesus' reign. He is a king -- and his "subjects" are alive and well on earth -- but, ultimately, Jesus' kingdom transcends our earthly concepts of power. Jesus faced down the temptation of a solely earthly kingship. At the close of his 40 days in the desert, the devil offered him the kingdoms of the world. Jesus only had to sacrifice his heavenly values and worship Satan. The same temptations to distort the kingship of Christ are present to us today. Jesus' invitation also endures. "Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." It is important for us to belong to the full truth of Christ's kingdom.

First, our own hearts must be transformed. Our own rebellions in favor of selfishness and against holiness must be conquered by God's grace. Second, we must work to transform the world as best we can in our own corner of it. Like Jesus shows us by his life and death, this doesn't mean domination. It means service, sacrifice, respect, and love. Our lives must "testify to the truth" of Jesus Christ, who lays down his life for his people. That is the true beauty of Christ the King!
