Dear Parishioners,

Now that our increased offertory campaign is winding down, I wish to thank all of you for the tremendous effort you have shown in keeping your commitment to financially support our Church. Our income has increased significantly due to the generous response from many caring and dedicated families. I realize this has been a sacrifice for many of you but such a financial commitment is helping us to address the financial needs facing our community.

Of the 1,425 registered parish households, 611 regularly contribute to the Sunday collections. This may seem like a small percentage but it is actually considered quite good when compared to other parishes nationally. In this recent campaign, we received a response from 232 families — 16% of our total households or 38% of our identified givers — resulting in a projected increase in offertory revenue of \$1,700 per week. I ask those that have made an increase in their offertory to continue contributing at this new level so we can meet our annual budget.

If you have yet to return your response envelope, there is still time to respond. Please take a special response envelope from the church vestibule and upon completion return it in the offertory collection or to the church office. You and your loved ones will be remembered in my prayers and I kindly ask that you remember me in yours also.

The two new chalices given in memory of Leighton Delahaye finally arrived from Spain, and Leighton's name is engraved on the bottom of each. I subsequently had one of our old chalices replated so that we now have four matching gold chalices with which to celebrate the Sunday Eucharist.

Last Sunday we began the process of learning a new musical setting for the Mass. The new setting is entitled the "Mass of Spirit and Grace" composed by Father Ricky Manalo, CSP, a Paulist priest currently teaching at Santa Clara University and the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, California. We are already familiar with some of his other compositions including "The God of All Grace," "Many and Great," and "Spirit and Grace."

It will take us a few weeks to become comfortable with the new music but please persevere because the Mass is so much more enjoyable and meaningful with all of you singing. You sing better than just about any other parish in which I have served and I want to encourage and foster that special characteristic of this community.

God blessed us with beautiful weather in which to celebrate the *Blessing of the Graves* on All Saints Day in our parish cemetery. We received many complements on the appearance of our cemetery so I once again acknowledge the hard work of our cemetery committee. The members are: Babs Babin, Beth Blanchard, Joanne Bourgeois, Jerry Deshotel, Larry Durbin, Arlen Landry, Ken Lemoine, Roy Mouch, Elaine Pierce, Earl Sarradet, and Ella Dean Thibodeaux. Thank you to everyone who came out for the blessing and to everyone who worked to clean the graves or bring flowers for the Feast of All Saints.

The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

"When he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they came to believe." Jesus predicted his resurrection in today's Gospel. But it wasn't until after the disciples witnessed the miraculous event that they realized what he had been talking about. At the time, Jesus' words seemed mysterious, even confusing. Those who heard him understandably thought his reference to "this temple" was about the Jewish house of worship. But it wasn't. He was talking about his body. This only became clear later.

As the saying goes, "hindsight is twenty-twenty." How often do we find ourselves in the midst of a situation that doesn't make sense at the time? We question the "meaning" of a sickness, a lost job, a betrayal, or a disappointment. But then, after time has passed, we can begin to see it from another angle. In fact, many times we begin to see how good came out of these tough situations. St. Paul says, "We know that all things work for good for those who love God," (Rom 8:28).

Sometimes it's hard to trust in God's promises, especially when his plan seems mysterious or confusing. But just as the disciples learned that Jesus knew what he was talking about, we can believe that too. He tells us that he is "the way and the truth and the life" (Jn 14:6). Although the way may seem indirect, Jesus' perspective is bigger than ours. He knows how to lead us to the fullness of life, in this world and the next. The path may not be one that we would choose. Even Jesus had to journey through the cross before his resurrection-the temple of his body was destroyed before it was rebuilt. But looking back, it's obvious that God's plans really do work out for the best.
