The New Orleans Saints are 5-1 and on a five game winning streak as they play the Minnesota Vikings at 7:20 p.m. today (Sunday), just after the conclusion of our "Feast on the Levee." LSU is also having a great season and is now 7-1 as they prepare for another epic matchup with Alabama next Saturday in Baton Rouge.

This Thursday, November 1, is the **Solemnity of All Saints** and a holy day of obligation. Our Masses on All Saints Day will be at 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. This year's **Blessing of the Graves** will take place next Saturday, November 3, at 11:00 a.m. in our parish cemetery. All are invited to attend.

We will once again place a "Book of Remembrance" in church beginning with the Feast of All Saints and remaining throughout the entire month of November. The book and accompanying candle serve as a visible reminder to offer prayers for our beloved dead and for all who have gone before us in faith. Feel free to once again write in the names of any of your deceased relatives and friends so that they may be included in our prayers.

As I mentioned last week, our custodian and maintenance director, Wayne Delapasse, will be retiring at the end of this year, and so we must begin the search for a new custodian/maintenance director to succeed him.

The duties include cleaning the church, office, and classrooms; vacuuming and mopping floors; emptying the trashcans; cleaning the bathrooms and restocking supplies; setting up the activity center for events and cleaning afterward; weeding the flower beds; and picking up paper on the church grounds. The ideal candidate would be someone who is reliable and physically able to handle the demands of the job.

We are somewhat flexible with the days and times, but would prefer to have someone here four or five days per week from 7:00 or 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Interested persons should pick up an employment application from the church office. The pay is negotiable depending upon experience.

This Friday evening and Saturday morning, November 2 & 3, is the monthly all-night Adoration of the



PARISH LANGUAGE

The Diocese of Baton Rough currently encompasses parishes whose populations communicate in English, Spanish, Vietnamese and even sign language. Many parishes were founded or occupied by French Settlers, and one may still hear Creole or Cajun French among their descendants.

A study of the parish records in the archives of the Diocese of Baton Rouge reveals the date when it could be said the "official language" of our parish transitioned from French to English in terms of parish records.

The minutes of the meetings of the marguilliers (the French term for elected leaders of the parish) were last recorded in French on May 29, 1975 by S. Landry, Secretaire. Two weeks later on June 1, 1875, the minutes were recorded in English by a new secretary and documents the election of that year's wardens (the English translation of marguilliers). From that point the minutes of the meetings, accounting, pew rentals, etc. were recorded in English. Thus was the ending of the forty year reign of French for documenting the business of the parish. French would continue to be spoken among parishioners and priests in daily life and during homilies and would not fully fade from common use until the 20th century.

30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Son of David, have pity on me!" Has the cry of Bartimaeus ever escaped your lips? Today's Gospel tells the story of a blind man with a difficult lot in life. He made a living by begging coins off passing travelers. When word reaches him that Jesus will be passing by, this is when he begins is shouts for mercy. Jesus hears Bartimaeus' cry and beckons him forward.

"What do you want me to do for you?" Last week, Jesus asked a similar question to James and John. Their response was a clutch for fame. Bartimaeus' response is much humbler. "Lord, I want to see." How strange this interaction must have seemed to the onlookers. The man is blind! Of course he wants to see! But Jesus is always teaching us. By asking us what we want, Jesus reveals the dispositions of our hearts. God already knows them, but do we? By asking James and John to name their ambition, their selfishness is exposed to them and to the other disciples. By asking Bartimaeus to name his longing, his faith is exposed to the entire crowd. Jesus invites participation in our own redemption. He doesn't save us without us!

Take some time in silent prayer today. Place yourself in this story of Bartimaeus. Imagine yourself there on the dusty, crowded roadside. Jesus is calling you! When you stand before him, his focus is on you and you alone. "What do you want me to do for you?" he asks. Search your heart. How would you respond? What part of your heart is Jesus asking you to expose? He has come to heal and to restore. May we, too, be sent! "Go ... your faith has saved you."
