Dear Parishioners,

The last two weeks of September and the first week of October were quite busy for me. I had the Louisiana State Convention of Priests, followed by a group trip to London, and then attendance at our annual Priests Retreat. Hopefully things can slow down between now and the *Feast*.

The highlight of the State Priests Convention was the keynote address given by Cardinal Timothy Dolan of New York. He encouraged us to see our priesthood as the "pearl of great price" as described by Jesus in the gospels. And he challenged us to preserve the unity between Christ and his Church.

Cardinal Dolan noted that some individuals and groups wish to annul the spousal bond that exists between Christ and his Church. They preach spirituality as opposed to religion, faith without the faithful, and Jesus but not the Church.

Catholics on the other hand see the Church as a family. We are born into the Church and it's part of our DNA. And yet in some ways the Church is also a dysfunctional family. Since it is composed of people the Church also contains sins, imperfections, and flaws.

Dolan said that the Church is always "Christ crucified between two thieves." As the Body of Christ, we are a Church on a cross with wounds. The nails of Christ's cross hold the Church together. And just as the risen Christ showed his wounds to his disciples, so we show our wounds to the world so the other wounded can approach and be healed.

Bishop Muench has requested that all Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion attend a refresher course designed to enhance one's appreciation of this important ministry. We have scheduled a 90 minute training session this Thursday, October 12, at 6:30 p.m., and again next Sunday, October 15, at 5:00 p.m. in the church. It will be the same presentation on both nights, so new and continuing Eucharistic Ministers may choose either session to attend.

Please note that we will follow a special Mass schedule on October 28-29, the weekend of the "Feast on

the Levee." The 4:30 p.m. Vigil Mass and 7:30 a.m. Mass are unchanged, but we substitute a **special 10:00 a.m. Mass** in place of the 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. Masses. Breakfast will be served at 8:00 a.m. and the food booths are scheduled to begin serving at 11:00 a.m., following the 10:00 a.m. Mass. Our 5K Race/1 Mile Run/Walk and Family Bike Ride will be held on Saturday, October 28h. Registration Forms are available in the back of church. You can either place your form in the collection basket or at the Church Office

Wednesday, November 1, is the *Solemnity of All Saints* and a holy day of obligation. Our Masses on All Saints Day will be at 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. This year's *Blessing of the Graves* will take place on the following Saturday, November 4, at 12:00 noon in our parish cemetery. All are invited to attend.

Through the Bishop's Annual Appeal, We can move mountains



27th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Come, let us kill him and acquire his inheritance." The tenants in today's parable murdered because of their greed. They had no respect for either the servants or the son of their landlord. Motivated only by their desire to own the property they cultivated, they did whatever was necessary to further their cause. But they were fools. They only thing they inherited was a death sentence in return for their wickedness.

Greed can act like poison to an otherwise healthy mind. Instead of allowing one to think clearly, an obsession with having "more" can cloud a person's judgment. Certainly it won't always lead to murder, but more often than not it leads to using people for our own ends or dismissing those who cannot help us get what we want. Treating others this way is never acceptable. It is an offense to human dignity and to God who made us in his own image. Greed can also have a blinding influence, preventing us from seeing the blessings that surround us. When our focus is on what we want instead of what we have, the tendency is to forget that we have anything at all. The only thing we can see is that which we don't yet possess.

Ultimately, greed makes us miserable. It fosters discontent for our life and disrespect for the lives of others. It is certainly not a fruit of the kingdom of God. Belonging to this heavenly realm means living a life of generosity instead of greediness. It means looking for ways to share what we have to improve the lives of others instead of hoarding more to "improve" our own lives. Jesus tells us that his kingdom belongs to those who produce its fruit. May we root out the weed of greed and instead cultivate generosity in the vine-yard of our hearts.
