Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday, September 17, is designated as Catechetical Sunday in Catholic parishes and schools throughout the United States. The theme this year is "Living As Missionary Disciples." All of our parish catechists will be invited forward during Mass to be commissioned for their ministry. Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each of us plays in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel.

I will be in New Orleans on Monday – Thursday of this week attending the Louisiana State Priests Convention. This convention began about 25 years ago and is held every four years in New Orleans in order to provide an opportunity for continuing formation, prayer, and priestly fraternity. We sometimes invite priests from neighboring states to attend if space is available.

The theme of the convention is "Shepherding Today as Priest, Prophet and King." The large group addresses will be given by Cardinal Timothy Dolan of New York, Bishop Gerald Kicanas of Tucson, and Bishop Daniel Flores of Brownsville. The breakout session topics include the effects of internet pornography, new programs for marriage preparation, pastoral care of people with same-sex attraction, and special prayers of deliverance


On Friday I leave for my 8-day trip to London, England. I will be traveling with a small group numbering 14 parishioners and friends. We will stay in London for the whole week while taking day trips to Stratford-upon-Avon, Oxford, and Bath. Father Joel LaBauve is scheduled to celebrate the Masses here next weekend, September 23 & 24, and Father Ryan Hallford the Masses the following weekend of September 30 & October 1. We will have Communion Services in place of our 8:00 a.m. weekday Masses September 19-22 and 26-29.

Catholics are once again invited to participate in "40 Days for Life," an interdenominational pro-life campaign which runs from September 27 to November 5. The first and most important way to participate in this campaign is to devote daily time in prayer for an end

to abortion. Second, you may wish to sign-up to participate in an hour of peaceful witness outside of the Delta Clinic on Colonial Drive in Baton Rouge. St. John the Baptist Parish usually adopts a Saturday to pray outside of the clinic. Please call Mary Benoit or Julie Millard to sign-up for an hour, or just come whenever you are able.

The Diocese of Baton Rouge is also sponsoring its third annual *LifeFest* on Saturday, October 7, starting at 10:00 a.m. at the Tracy Center Ballroom in Baton Rouge. Admission is free and lunch is provided. The theme is "Proclaiming the Gospel of Life as Missionary Disciples," and the keynote speaker is Dr. Brian Pedraza, assistant professor of theology at Franciscan Missionaries of Our Lady University. The day will conclude with the annual Bishop's Respect Life Mass celebrated at 4:00 p.m. Visit www.MFLDIOBR.org to register or for more information.



24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to. Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you?" The parable Jesus tells today is the story of a king, but in truth it is about Jesus himself. He is the "king" who has forgiven our debts. We are the "servants" whose sins have earned us chastisement. But when we repent and ask for Christ's mercy, he grants it to us without hesitation.

The point of the parable, then, is that we too should extend this mercy to others. We should not be like that "wicked servant" who begged for mercy but would not show it to others. Elsewhere, Jesus teaches us to pray, "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors" (Mt. 6:12). We use different words, but a similar meaning when we pray the Our Father asking God to "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." But are we sure that we mean what we say?

It's important to pause and evaluate how we are doing in this regard. Are we harboring any grudges? Are there people we refuse to forgive? Is there a situation where we are seeking revenge instead of extending mercy? Jesus asks us to do otherwise. He reminds us that we have already been forgiven. We are right now enjoying the benefits of his forgiveness. So we are called to bear in mind our own sins, failings, weaknesses, and "debts" when we deal with others instead of thinking that we are perfectly innocent and acting as if we've never been the beneficiary of mercy. So let us do our best to forgive as we have been forgiven. This doesn't mean approving of wrong behavior; God doesn't ask us to do that. But he does ask us to let go of bitterness and foster mercy instead.
