FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Parishioners,

A certain priest seeing an elderly lady devotedly lighting a candle at the feet of Saint Michael the Archangel and another at the devil's tail, asked her, "Madam, will you tell me what this means?" "Listen Father," she said, "I have lit a candle to Saint Michael because he is now up high and winning, but also a small candle to the devil, in case someday they switch roles. I am playing it safe." In today's Gospel we see the dishonest steward playing safe with the position he holds, so that when he loses his position, he can still be safe and enjoy the respect of the people.

Why did Jesus praise the dishonest employee that we saw in today's Gospel? Was it because he deviously made friends with the money that was not his? Or was it because everyone agreed with his cleverness? No! Why then did Jesus praise him? Jesus praises the cleverness and courage the manager showed at the critical situation. What Jesus wants to convey to us through the Gospel is, that like the steward in the Gospel, we need to act with courage and prudence. We should waste no time and opportunity for doing good, and we should not wait until the last minute. So what we see here is, Jesus praises the cleverness of the man and not the means he used.


Like the elderly lady in the above story, and the clever manager in today's Gospel, perhaps we too play safe. We too, can be devious and yet justify our actions. And if we look carefully at our life, we will notice that this playing safe is only when it comes to worldly or physical matters and not too often for our own needs. But when it comes to spiritual matters, we don't show that kind of cleverness. This is what we call living a double standard. What makes us live a double standard? Is it our lack of understanding about the balance we have to keep between the worldly and the spiritual? Do we think that the more money or material possessions we have, the happier we become? If this is our thinking and belief then that is all the reason for us to be caught up in worldly things and physical needs, and that can affect the spiritual side of our life and our soul. We have to remember that a human being is made up of both body and soul, and it's imperative that we meet the needs of both body and soul. Or else, there is the danger of losing sight of one aspect and overemphasize the other.

Some tourists at Niagara Falls heard a shriek from the river. As they looked on, the origin of the scream became visible. It rose from a vulture whose claws were caught up in the thick hide of the carcass of a buffalo, floating in the river. It had pierced its claws deep into the carcass, so as to balance itself in the current and eat the flesh. As it drew closer to the waterfall, it sensed danger and gave out a scream. The vulture failed to pull out its claws from the carcass, and in no time, the bird fell into the waterfall along with the carcass. It could not eat the carcass and be saved at the same time. This is what happens when our hearts are so deeply immersed in the physical and worldly needs; we fail to pull out when necessary. So, we must be careful when we get immersed in one aspect of our life and neglect the other.

We see that when a tragedy strikes us, we remember the Lord; but at other times we don't even think about him. Today's readings call us to realize the need to put a balance in our life, between the spiritual and the physical or the worldly, to the needs of body and soul, so that we may not find ourselves trapped and lose the kingdom Jesus promised us.


CHRISTIAN FOMATION
