Dear Parishioners,

On my recent vacation to Lake Tahoe we attended Sunday Mass at Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parish in Truckee, California. The Parish was founded in 1869 and now worships in a new church at a new location just outside of town. Their pastor also happened to be on vacation the weekend we were there so Mass was celebrated by a retired priest from Ireland. It was a very enjoyable Mass even though it went an hour and twenty minutes long, mostly due to a long homily.

I especially enjoyed the music at Mass which was somewhat reminiscent of the folk Masses I attended in the 1970's and 80's. The choir was comprised of about six vocalists accompanied by a guitarist, bassist, and pianist. They sang a variety of hymns, some old and some new, and were supported fairly well by the congregation. Good music and good participation by the congregation usually result in a good Mass experience and this was our experience in Truckee, with a few points deducted for the extended homily.

Some Catholics can be quite opinionated about the style of music they prefer at Mass. Some prefer traditional hymns accompanied by organ; others prefer a more contemporary Christian sound; and the majority fall somewhere in between. I happen to enjoy all styles of liturgical music, including gospel, and don't mind a somewhat eclectic mix on Sundays. I especially enjoy the admirable level of congregational singing here at St. John the Baptist so please continue your great participation in our sung prayer.

Credit for the quality of our music ministry largely goes to Celeste Veillon along with our choir, cantors, and accompanists. Celeste chooses the hymns each week to complement the themes of the readings or the particular feast day, and then rehearses with the other members to make sure that their singing is conducive to prayer and participation by you, the congregation. Your voices add strength, temperament, and fullness to the music in a way that completes the song and unites us in worship, so please keep up the good work.

As I am sure you know, the town of Addis was incorporated in September 1915 and therefore celebrates its

100th Anniversary next weekend. The two-day celebration begins on Friday evening, September 11, with music, a parade, and fireworks, and continues all day on Saturday, September 12, with music, food, children's games, and many other activities. Congratulations to Mayor David Toups, the town council, and all of the residents of this cherished community! Please help them to make their celebration a success by joining in the festivities.

The parish office will be closed on Monday, September 7, in recognition of Labor Day and to allow our hard-working staff a day of rest. As much as we enjoy days off and vacation days, studies show that most Americans also derive a great deal of pleasure from their work. There may be aspects of work that we don't enjoy or co-workers who aggravate us, but by and large we enjoy what we do. I certainly enjoy being a priest and I pray you enjoy your work also as well as this Labor Day in recognition of all you do for your family and our community.

23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

"He took him off by himself away from the crowd. He put his finger into the man's ears and, spitting, touched his tongue." Jesus could have healed this deaf man another way. He could have spoken a powerful word or, for that matter, just silently willed that the man's health be restored. It wasn't uncommon for Jesus to cure people simply by a quick touch. But instead, Jesus chose to heal him in this unique way. He made it a private event, one that involved an unusual kind of physical ritual.

Clearly, this was not for Jesus' sake. And since it was away from the crowd, it wasn't for their sake either. This particular healing was for this particular man. For whatever reason, Jesus knew that this man needed these signstouching his ears and putting saliva on his tongue--in order to be freed of his inability to hear and speak well.

Jesus knows what we need. His care for each and every one of us is not some standardized package of generic charity. He loves us all as unique individuals and understands us. He sees our weaknesses and knows our strengths. He offers himself to us as an intimate friend, not an unfamiliar acquaintance. When we come to him with our hopes, our fears, our desires and needs, he hears and answers us ... in the way he knows is best. It might seem odd. It might be unexpected or different from what we have seen him do for others. But we need to trust, even when we are desperate for "healing," that Jesus does care, that he does listen, and that he does act on our behalf.

Let us have confidence in today's Old Testament proclamation from Isaiah: "Thus says the LORD: Say to those whose hearts are frightened: Be strong, fear not! Here is your God ... he comes to save you."
