Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday, September 21, is designated as *Catechetical Sunday* for Catholic parishes and schools in the United States. It coincides with the start of Christian Formation classes in Parish Schools of Religion, as well as with RCIA sessions for those inquiring into the Catholic faith, and bible studies for adult Catholics interested in deepening their faith. We are blessed to have all of these opportunities available here at St. John the Baptist thanks to our many dedicated and talented catechists. Formation classes for our children start on Monday night so please say a prayer for all of our students and teachers.

Our Sunday Visitor published a nice pamphlet entitled "Top Ten Ways to be an Outstanding Catechist." I won't go through all ten but Number 6 is, "Outstanding catechists instruct their students in the art of prayer." It is a great reminder that in addition to teaching Catholic beliefs, good catechists also model and reinforce the importance of prayer. Our students will have already learned about prayer from their parents and grandparents but it doesn't hurt to build upon that foundation and further their experience. It reminds us that the greatest of all prayers is the Mass that we are fortunate to celebrate together each week.

Number 1 on the Top Ten list is, "Outstanding catechists know that, to form saints, we ourselves must become saints." Volunteering to teach religion is a wonderful act of service for which I am very grateful. It is also a call to holiness so that the catechist might grow in his or her faith and love for God at the same time that he or she is passing on that faith to his or her students. We cannot expect our children to grow in love and charity if we as adults are not also willing to grow spiritually.

Catholics are once again invited to participate in "40 Days for Life," an interdenominational pro-life campaign focused on prayer & fasting, peaceful vigil, and community outreach. This will be the fourth year that the Baton Rouge religious community has participated in this national and international effort. This year's campaign runs from September 24 to November 2 which overlaps with our own Catholic Church's "Respect Life Month" observance in October.

The first and most important way to participate in this campaign is to devote daily time in prayer for an end to abortion. Second, you may wish to sign-up to participate in an hour of peaceful witness outside of the Delta Clinic on Colonial Drive in Baton Rouge. St. John the Baptist Parish has adopted Saturday, October 11, from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. as our day to pray outside of the clinic, so try to help us fill those hours if you are able. Call Mary Benoit or Julie Millard to sign-up for an hour, or just come whenever you are able.

Finally, Charis Ministries is a Jesuit ministry to young adults in their 20s and 30s. They are offering a "Spirit@Work Retreat" in our parish on Saturday, November 1, from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.. The cost is \$35 which includes lunch and supper, and the retreat is open to all young adults throughout the Diocese. 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Are you envious because I am generous?" So often, we expect God to operate the way we do. We expect to be able to understand everything he does. When we don't, it's tempting to think that the problem is on God's end, not ours. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells a parable about God's mercy. And some of us may not understand it at first glance. Why should the "lazy" workers who showed up late in the day be given the same wage as the diligent ones? Doesn't this suggest a kind of fundamental disrespect for the efforts of the first group? Extending the principle spiritually, we might ask a similar question. Why should sinners who spend much of their lives doing wrong be allowed to "show up" suddenly and receive the mercy of God? What about those faithful Christians who have walked the road of virtue all along? Shouldn't they receive something more than these ne'er-dowells?

As Jesus points out, there is nothing unjust about being generous (or merciful) to a certain group or individual. As long as no one is cheated out of what they were promised, there is no reason for envy or anger. Furthermore, and perhaps this is the real point of the parable, no one should be so quick to assume that he or she is a diligent worker. In fact, when we honestly assess our own weaknesses and sins, when we acknowledge the ways that we personally have fallen short of perfect virtue, the picture changes. It becomes clear that in fact we are the beneficiaries of God's generous mercy. We are the ones who showed up late in the day. Instead of calculating the degree of others' sins, let us call to mind and be sorry for our own. Then we can truly rejoice in God's forgiveness, no matter who is so fortunate as to receive it.
